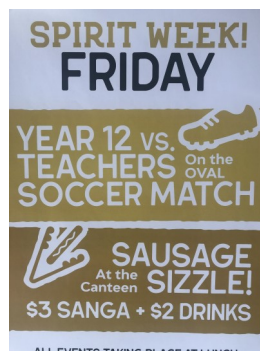
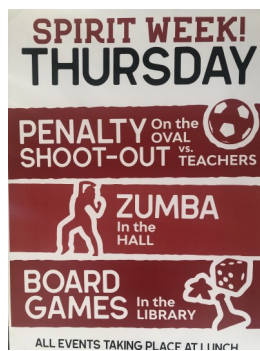
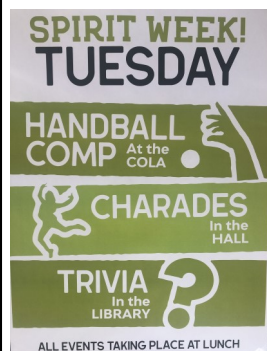
Spirit Week

From The Deputy Principal

The use of e-cigarettes is on the rise, particularly among high school students, and, we felt it important to provide parents with some relevant background information. The act of using an e-cigarette is called “vaping.” Electronic cigarettes are battery-operated devices that heat a liquid to produce a vapour that is inhaled. The fluid usually contains propylene glycol, glycerol, nicotine and added flavouring(s). The devices are designed to deliver the aerosol directly to the lungs. The steam emitted from the e-cigarette is more like a plume of smoke, more so than a conventional cigarette. Some devices resemble conventional cigarettes, while more recently developed devices look like everyday items such as pens or USB memory sticks. The appeal of these flavoured e-cigarettes to adolescents has led to their rapid uptake around the world.



The Australian National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) is concerned that e-cigarettes have ‘renormalised’ smoking. A worryingly recent study has also found that e-cigarette users were three times more likely than non e-cigarette users to subsequently become tobacco smokers. While the damaging impact of smoking tobacco is well known, the short and long-term health effects of e-cigarettes are still being researched. Although the compositions of the e-cigarette liquids vary, they all contain a range of different solvents and flavouring agents which have the potential to increase the risk of developing cardiovascular, cancer and respiratory diseases.

- Under the NSW Public Health (Tobacco) Act 2008, it is illegal to sell e-cigarettes or e-cigarette accessories to a person under 18 years of age.
- It is illegal to display, advertise or promote e-cigarettes.
- The sale and use of e-liquid nicotine, including in e-cigarettes, is against the law.

As such, if a student is caught using an e-cigarette at school then we will adhere to the school’s discipline policy and suspensions could ensue. You may wish to have a discussion with your child around their awareness and negative health impact of these e-cigarettes.



Subject Selection

For Stages 5 and 6—2021

Update

Subject selection for Years 8 and 10 is now well underway with websites for Stages 5 and 6 launched so students can find out more about electives and patterns of study for the next stage of their schooling.

Year 10 students have had individualised interviews with head teachers to access guidance in different courses of study. Notes with personalised details for logins and access codes for electronic submission have also been issued. Year 10 may now submit their selections electronically until Friday 7th August.

Year 8 students will receive their electronic webcodes and login details during the first week of Term 3, and they will also have until Friday 7th August to submit their elective preferences.

Please be assured that this is not a “first in, first served” process. Students should take time to consult with both parents and teachers to ensure they make the best decisions for their future pathway.

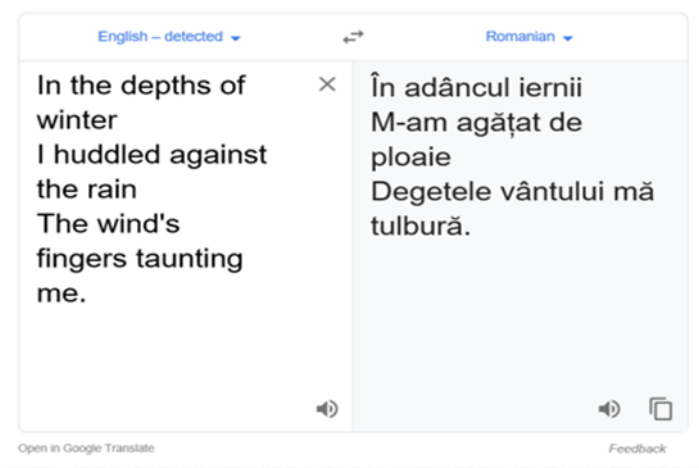
POETRY AND CONTEMPORARY POSSIBILITIES – YEAR 11

Pop up Poetry Day: Year 11

In Year 11 English Standard, we took a little break from our unit on Contemporary Possibilities for Pop up Poetry Day. Using a simple three-line structure, each student in Mrs Ragnarsson's class wrote a poem that had:

- 1) A reference to time in the first line (e.g. "In the depths of winter")
- 2) An action in first person (e.g. "I huddled against the rain")
- 3) Vivid sensory language (e.g. "The wind's fingers taunting me").

It didn't stop there, though. The unit of Contemporary Possibilities explores the potential of new text types across multimodal forms to convey meaning in new and surprising ways. So we put our poems into Google Translate three times to see how far sense and syntax could be stretched. Here are some of our efforts (Hawaiian being surprisingly popular).

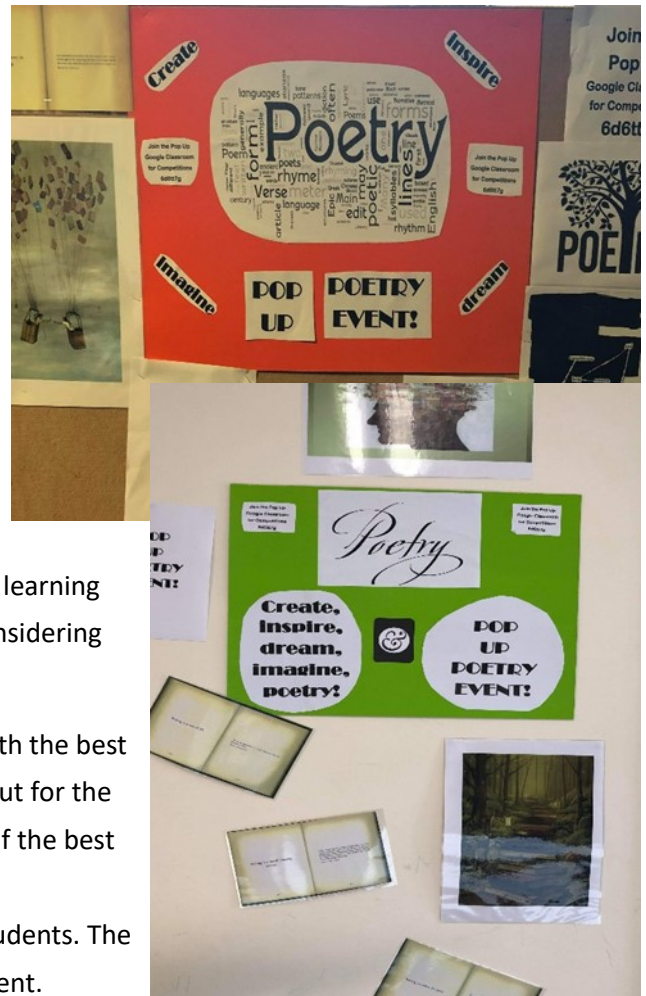

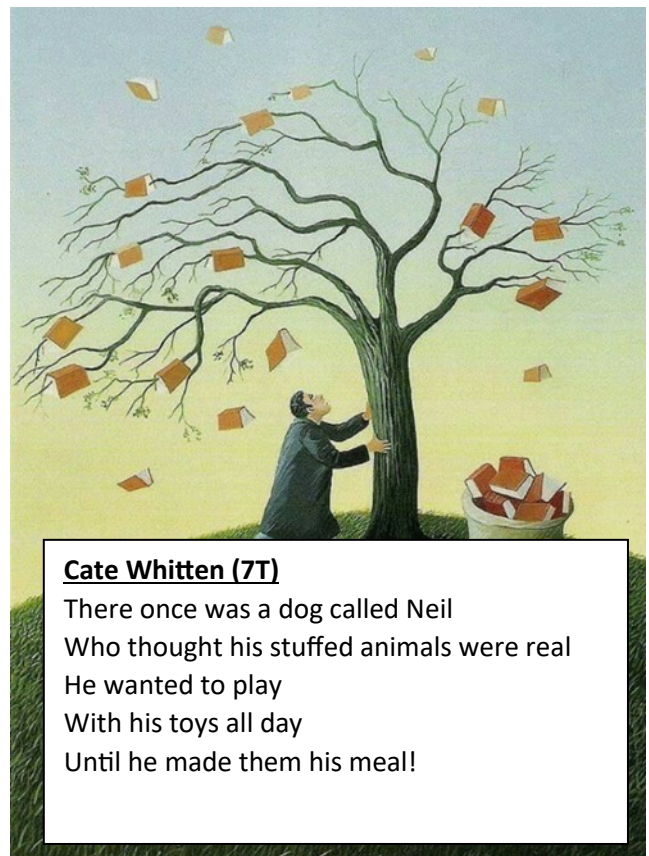

4 July, 1776 – The Declaration of Independence was approved by the Continental Congress.

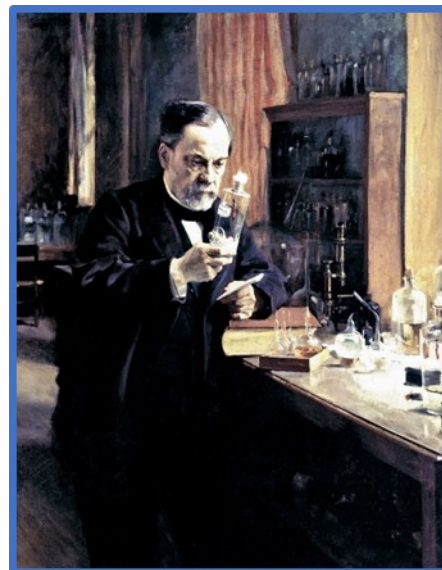
6 July, 1885 – Louis Pasteur gives the 1st successful anti-rabies inoculation to a boy who had been bitten by an infected dog.

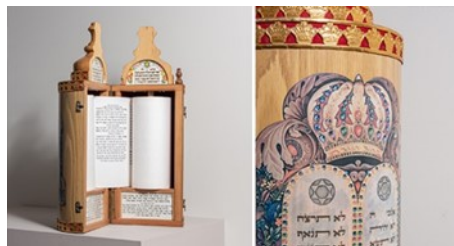
Jews from Islamic Lands

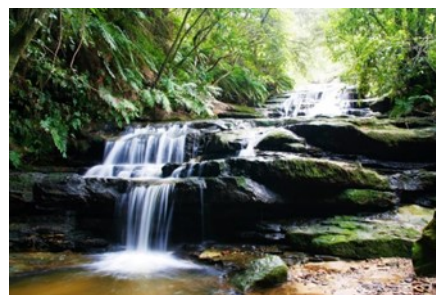

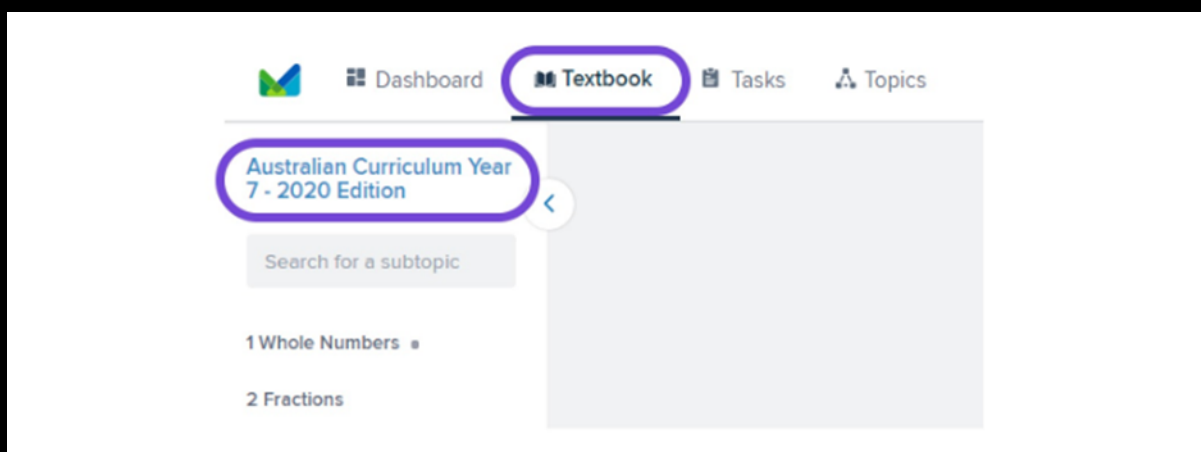

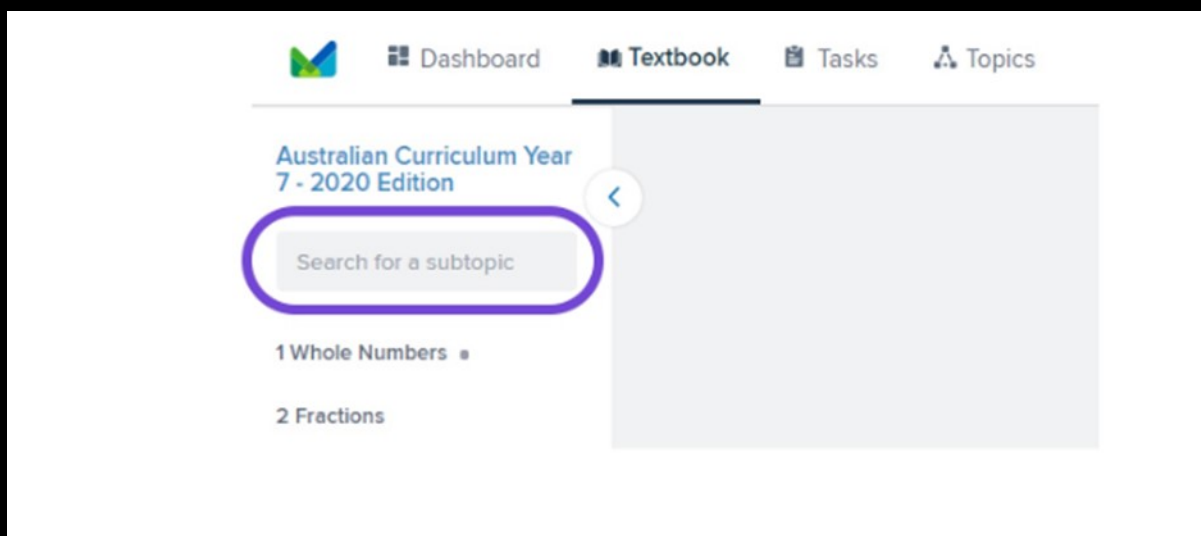
Mathematical Musings

Students can access the Mathspace Textbook from the navigation bar. The first thing they should ensure is that they have chosen the correct curriculum.

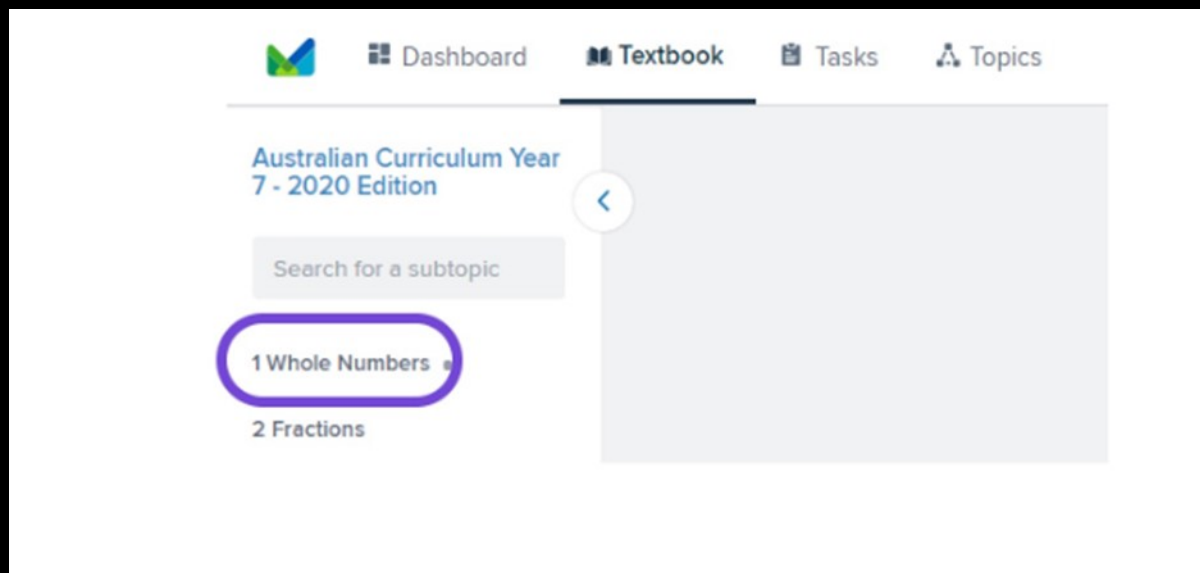


Students can search for the subtopic if they know what it is called.

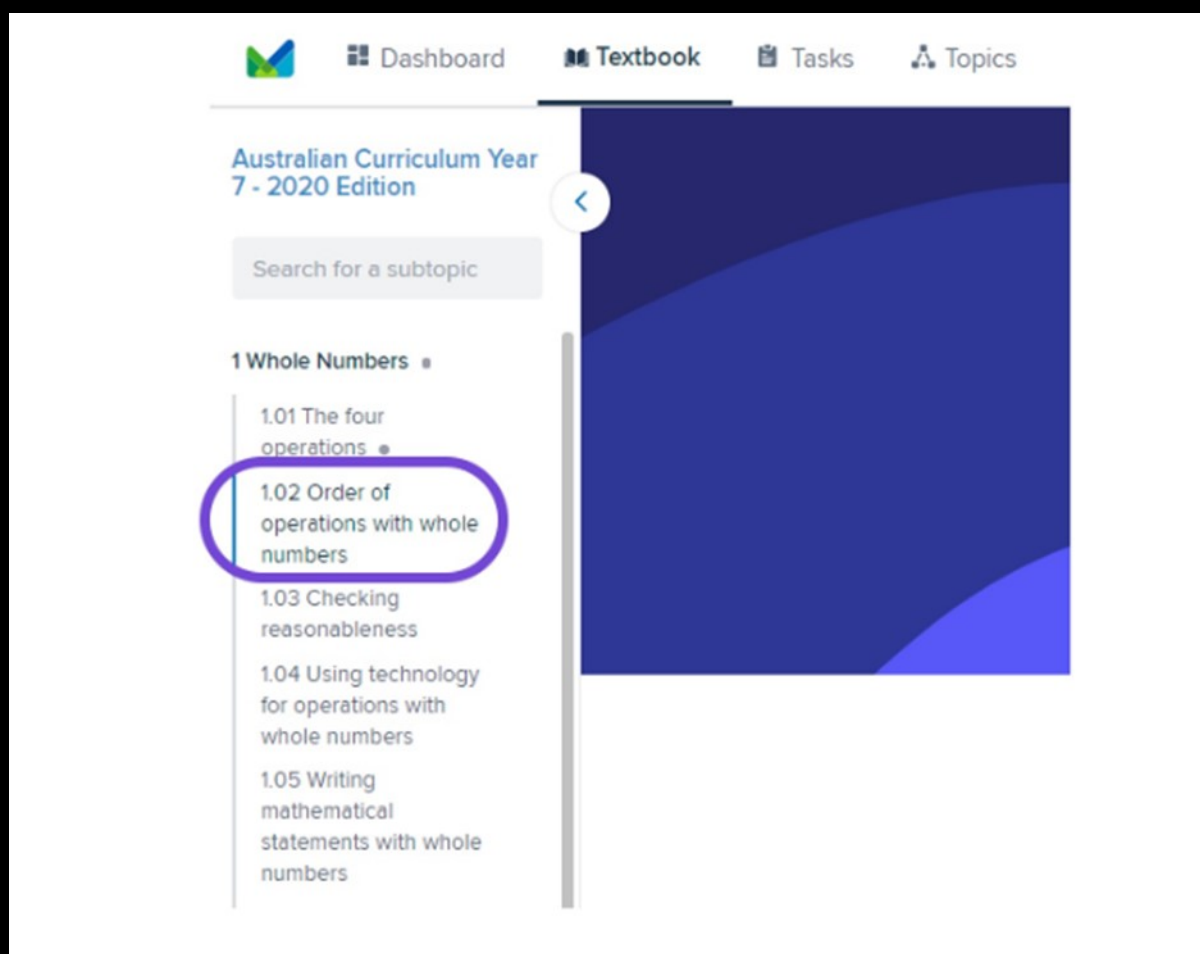



3. Evaluate any addition or subtraction, reading from left to right.

Students can view the full solution of any question, watch a video if there is one, or try a similar problem with different numbers.

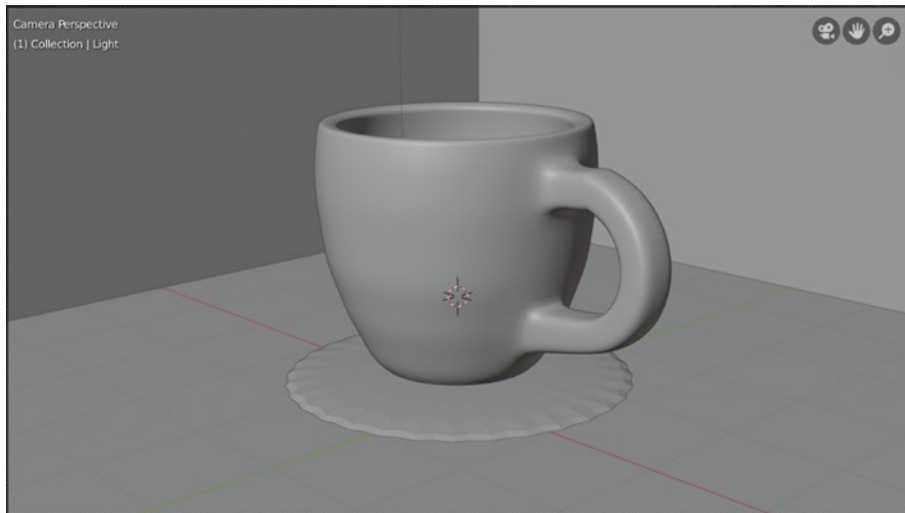
