From The Principal ...

During this year, the value of parent and community support has been immeasurable to the staff and the school particularly through the challenges presented by COVID. Strong community support is an essential ingredient for an excellent school including the financial support through school contributions. Many thanks to all parents who have finalized elective fees and made a financial contribution. Next week invoices for elective fees and school contributions will be sent. In clarifying these two payment categories I would like to explain the following:



Elective fees:

These are subject specific fees supporting programs that are implemented above and beyond the minimum requirements of the curriculum. An example of this is the practical components of Food Technology, TAS courses such as Woodwork and Visual Arts. Our programs aim to give our students a rich and engaging learning experience and this will involve the purchase of consumable items that each student will use. These subjects are not mandatory and students are able to elect to study non fee attracting subjects.

School Contributions:

These are voluntary payments that go toward funding school enhancements both environmentally and in the classroom. Current focus areas for this funding are:

- Continued maintenance of airconditioned classrooms (this is not funded by the Department of Education)
- Payment of very high electricity bills due to extensive air conditioning
- Continued upgrading and maintenance of technology
- Continued enhancement of school facilities that are not funded by the Department of Education such as ongoing development of landscaped grounds and pleasant outdoor areas, covered handball courts, modernize the hall

From The Deputy Principal ...

Last term, I wrote an article indicating the use of e-cigarettes was on the increase among teenagers in Australia. We have continued to implement numerous welfare and discipline strategies at the school to address this issue and support students but I think it is timely to reproduce parts of the article to further inform parents about what these devices look like and their impact on health.

Electronic cigarettes are battery-operated devices that often look like a USB stick that heat a liquid to produce a flavoured vapour that is inhaled. The devices deliver the aerosol directly to the lungs. The appeal of these flavoured e-cigarettes to adolescents has led to their rapid uptake around the world.

The Australian National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) is concerned that e-cigarette users were three times more likely than non-e-cigarette users to subsequently become tobacco smokers. While the damaging impact of smoking tobacco is well known, the short and long-term health effects of e-cigarettes are still being researched.

New South Wales Health also have information on their web site in relation to e-cigarettes:

- Under the *NSW Public Health (Tobacco) Act 2008,* it is illegal to sell e-cigarettes or e-cigarette accessories to a person under 18 years of age.
- The sale and use of e-liquid nicotine, including in e-cigarettes, is against the law.
- E-cigarettes are not harm-free and may expose users and bystanders to chemicals that are harmful to health. The Therapeutic Goods Administration has not approved e-cigarettes as an aid to help smokers to quit.
- The Australian Chief Medical Officer and all state and territory Chief Health Officers have issued a statement outlining the emerging link between e-cigarette use and severe lung disease.
- The sale and use of e-liquid nicotine, including in e-cigarettes are against the NSW Poisons and Therapeutic Goods Regulation 2008. This means e-cigarettes containing nicotine cannot be sold in Australia

We continue to have conversations with students here at school about making positive choices in life and the impacts of choices on health and wellbeing, but it would be beneficial for parents to also have such conversations with your child about e-cigarettes. Some students do feel confronted in a peer group and need to be supported in making

need to be supported in making the right decision not to indulge in this behaviour. An example of some of these devices has been included.

INTRODUCTION TO THE HSC – SESSIONS FOR INCOMING YEAR 12

Last week we held an introduction to the HSC session for our incoming Year 12 (Class of 2021). Mrs Hourigan explained how HSC school-based assessments, the HSC examination and ATAR calculations work together, using her signature Spongebob presentation. Mrs Ragnarsson detailed NESA* assessment procedures, organisational strategies and malpractice issues, while Mrs Fornari spoke about support structures such as Disability Provisions and the Educational Access Scheme. Mrs Fisher wrapped up with a look at post-school options.

Slides from the presentation have been emailed to all students and parents of the class of 2021. Students have also received the HSC Stage 6 Assessment Handbook and NESA HSC Rules and Procedures document.

This introductory session is just the beginning of the journey for our incoming Year 12, and no doubt the start of many conversations. We look forward to supporting our students through their HSC year.

<u>Competitions in Science – The Real</u> <u>Reason Scientists Talk to Other People!</u>

This year, the Science faculty has run 2 extremely successful and popular competitions – The Big Science Competition in Term 2 and the Science Olympiads in Term 3.



These competitions are a chance for our students to show just how knowledgeable they are, and they certainly did! The Big Science competition is open to our Junior years (7-10), with exams tailored for each year level. In Year 7, we had 6


participants, with 2 of them achieving outstanding results. Andrew Anastasiadis scored a perfect 30/30, a result that put him in the top 1% of competitors and receiving a High Distinction! In Year 8, we also had 6 participants, 3 of whom achieved a Credit for their efforts. Year 9 only had 2 participants, both of whom achieved a Credit. Finally, we had 3 Year 10 students participate, all achieving a Credit or higher.



The Science Olympiads are held usually to find students in Year 11 who excel in any of the 4 major sciences (Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Earth & Environmental) and offer them a chance to compete in the International Science Olympiad,

a competition that is held overseas every year and brings together the best and brightest students from around the globe to compete in a battle of the minds. This year, Year 10 students were also offered the chance to participate in the Junior Olympiad, which contains questions from all science fields at a Year 11 level. We had 2 students in Year 10 who demonstrated an outstanding level of understanding of Science: Zac Bechara, who achieved a High Distinction and Poppy Williams, who achieved a Distinction. Our Year 11 students performed extremely well, with 3 of our students achieving a Distinction or High Distinction for their efforts. Jonah Sewell, one of our extremely passionate senior scientists, achieved a Distinction or higher in Biology, Chemistry and Physics – an outstanding achievement!

We look forward to encouraging more emerging scientists to participate in these, and other, competitions in the future!

Mitchell Youth Leadership Program Report

The Mitchell Youth Leadership Program held on the 16th of October was a successful day despite the obvious change in presentation and setting. It was a day of many activities and lessons which was successful in shaping us to not only become better leaders individually but as a team.

Virtual Keynote Presentation

The day began with a virtual keynote presentation given by the Head of Leadership, Development and Culture (ANZ) for Domino's Pizza Enterprises, Matt Kershaw, who grew up in the Hills District and was able to effectively relate with us and inspire us for the future through his aptitude of public speaking and storytelling. Kershaw's presentation was quite anecdotal in the terms of his method of enlightening us with the 'truths of leadership' highly dependent upon his personal experiences which kept us engaged and interested. He told us stories from his schooling years and struggles with overcoming his introverted personality and from the time he underwent surgery to remove a fatally 17.5cm tumour from his chest. Kershaw divided the essence of effective leadership into 5 key sections:

- 1. Leadership is an action
- 2. Leaders put the future in their own hands
- 3. Be what you want your world to become
- 4. Have a bold vision then make big things small
- 5. Titles and accolades are temporary, but our legacy will endure

Which allowed us to have a good understanding of how to become the best leaders which we can be and what we need to be aware of during this journey. At the end of the presentation, as a group we were given the opportunity to reflect upon what we had

just assimilated by recognising key ideas, things we found interesting and questions that we had. This enabled us to condense what we had learnt and have a clear understanding of what the "truth of leadership" is. One of the core things we found interesting/most meaningful included:

- Take ownership of your circumstances
- Success is not a moment, it's a continual journey
- In order to achieve the big things, we need to focus on the small things (taking things step by step)

Team Building Exercises

As part of their program, one of the core aims of this workshop was to facilitate an environment where the students could get to know each other more and essentially develop a stronger team. This was achieved through three main team building exercises:







1. Where do you stand?

"Where do you stand?" was an interactive activity which made us contemplate upon our personal values and get to know the values which our fellow peers stood by. The exercise consisted of a series of statements which varied in seriousness with the first statement being 'Cats are better than dogs' whilst others followed as 'Bullying is an issue at this school'. On the floor, the facilitators had divided areas into; strongly disagree, disagree, neutral, agree and strongly agree and essentially this exercise asked us to showcase your stance on a particular statement.

Throughout the exercise there were some cases in which the group was in complete disagreement with each other or equally divided on two opinions. There was surprisingly never a time where everyone was unequivocally agreeing on one opinion. However, despite the differences in opinions we had no trouble in respecting each other's opinions and beliefs and further learnt that discussion is key to cooperation. The exercise provided an excellent opportunity to debate and understand each others perspectives in a very safe space which should be highly credited to the facilitators who allowed us to converse with each other whilst maintaining positivity during those "controversial" statements.

2. Communication Building Blocks

Communication Building Blocks was by far one of the most fun and best activities which we all felt was a good team bonding session. This particular exercise was a competitive game which required two separate teams that consisted of two builders, two communicators and two engineers. The aim of this game was for these communicators to instruct the builders to build an unseen Lego arrangement based off the descriptions provided by the engineers. Despite the concept of the game sounding relatively easy, it proved to be a great challenge and we agreed we all struggled. This was primarily due to the fact we were under a time limit of 20 minutes, in close proximity with the other group hence it was quite loud, and each role had their individual difficulties. For instance, for the builders, their biggest challenge was listening to the instructions whilst for the engineers it was providing instructions concisely. However, for the communicators they had to essentially deal with both these challenges. Nonetheless, both teams did surprisingly quite well with the organisers commenting saying that the resemblance between the original and final product was the closest they had ever seen. Furthermore, they even said our strategies were also something they had never seen before and were quite astounded by our level of teamwork. Overall, it truly was such a fun game and at the end we learnt that as a leader when issuing instructions, it must be clear, concise, and as short (but as detailed) as possible.



3. Values

One of the last team activities was a reflection of what we truly value. As a group we were asked to select our top eight values (which we ended up exceeding to ten). This was a short exercise but just as crucial as the rest as it

enabled us to reflect on what we had learnt and discuss as a group what we want to embody and achieve towards. Our top ten values which we have agreed to uphold during our leadership term are (in no particular order):

- Respect
- Positivity

- Trust
- Community
- Empathy
- Initiative
- Teamwork
- Honesty
- Balance
- Fun

After this discussion, we had a cool down session crafting individual posters of each value which is now showcased in our homeroom to demonstrate to the younger SRC members what we stand for as well as a source of inspiration.

Principal's Workshop

The Principal's Workshop was undoubtedly the most helpful and most needed part of the entire program. This workshop was a session where Mrs Hourigan came to talk to us and provide her insight on "leadership" and was key in determining what we were going to achieve toward this year. As a team we presented various ideas and goals which we wanted to obtain

by the end of our leadership year to Mrs Hourigan and Mrs Jones. However as we recited our ideas to our teachers, it became clearer and clearer how disorganised we were. Whilst we had big aspirations and the necessary drive to achieve them, we lacked planning and a sense of direction required to execute these ideas.


We were taught about the SMART method of organising and establishing our goals and were incredibly effective in condensing our ideas into four main ones. With the help of the teachers who informed us on restrictions we needed to consider, teachers we needed to talk to and provided us with some realism to ensure our goals were realistic and achievable. The four main goals of our leadership year are:

- 1. Bike shelters
- 2. Instagram page
- 3. AIM lessons
- 4. Organisation of carnivals and increasing enthusiasm for these school carnivals.

However, we believe it could have been made even more successful if the Mitchell Youth Leadership leaders had helped us culminate our ideas before presenting to Mrs Hourigan, perhaps even given us suggestions. This would

ensure ideas being presented to Mrs Hourigan were logical, thought out and efficient. Nonetheless, this workshop was highly effective as in accordance we have created a google document with extensive planning (following the SMART guidelines) of each of the four goals.









Facilitators

The significant success of the virtual version of the Mitchell Youth Leadership Program could not have been achieved without the talented facilitators. These facilitators were extremely kind, patient and fun, acting as a pure example of what this workshop was helping us to become, a good leader. Their abilities in organising and presenting the workshop is to be commended for it was them who helped us develop such a cohesive leadership team by the end of the day and inspired us to create change.

So, on behalf of the 2020-2021 leadership team, we would like to say a huge thank you to Lauren, Ronan and Sarah (our facilitators) and to the Mitchell Youth Leadership forum for such a brilliant virtual version of their program and for the great opportunity to build our leadership skills.





Canvas: Learning Management System (LMS)

Crestwood High School is currently trialling a new Learning Management System (LMS) called Canvas. The system is designed to replace the multiple Learning Management Systems used across the school such as Edmodo and Google Classroom. It also integrates with Sentral, Education Perfect and Turn-it-in. This system will provide a more consistent approach to online learning across the faculties. It will also reduce the amount of log in passwords and codes required to join classes to access classwork, assignments and assessments. The communication tools of the LMS also includes parents and caregivers associated with the students and regularly emails details about class activities.

The current trial is being used by a number of faculties in a variety of subjects and in most year groups, however, not all students will be involved at this stage. It is our plan to professionally develop the staff over the course of the term to ensure the system is used effectively. You may receive emails regarding Canvas. It is not junk mail or spam. 27 Oct 1904 – The New York City subway begins operating, the 1st underground and underwater rail system in the world.










29 Oct 1929 – Black Thursday on Wall Street leads to financial collapse and the start of the Great Depression.

School Travel for 2021

Applications for student travel in 2021 opened from Monday 12 October 2020.

Students who require a School Opal card or travel pass for 2021 can now apply online. A new application should be submitted if a student is applying for a new travel pass for the **first time** or requesting an **additional pass as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation** (e.g. joint custody).

Students who have changed school/campus, changed address, repeated a year or received an expiry notification from Transport for NSW for their school travel entitlement should re-apply or update their details.

If you have not changed your details in any way and your card is still valid, there is no need to do anything, your current card continues into the following year.

These students have been introduced to a variety of new tools and experiences, many of them using power tools for the first time. In the production of the box students got to use plunge routers to make corner halving joints and a bobbin sander to shape decorative components. Importantly they have all learnt how to solve problems and work as a group to complete their work, any defects had to be resolved with the use of hand tools.

Their next project is a coffee table with angled and curved legs and this project is a strong steppingstone for skills in timber shaping, which will become more important for many of their design modifications.
