Congratulations to our Distinguished Achievers in the HSC 2020. These students were recognized by NESA as a 'Distinguished Achiever' achieving at a band 6 in at least one subject or an E4 in one extension subject. Last year was an extremely challenging year for Year 12 students, their parents and teachers. It is incredibly pleasing to see our students perform with distinction and most importantly, find their post school pathway in tertiary education, trade training or employment. Congratulations to Kaitlyn Seymour achieving the highest ATAR of 98.02 (7th in the state in CAFS) and also is an 'All Rounder' achieving a band 6 in 6 subjects. Additional outstanding achievements include Selena Cardillo – 99 Industrial Technology (3rd in the State), Arthi Sundaram – 98 Drama and 49/50 English Extension 2, Tess Pesavento 97 in Mathematics Standard 2 (11th in the state).

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From The Deputy Principal ...

Welcome to all families for the start of, what we all hope to be, a fantastic year. The start of the term has been smooth with students engaging in lessons from day one. Year 7 students are quickly learning the routines and with guidance from their Year 10 Peer Support leaders are getting used to the buildings, timetables and playgrounds. Students can also access their Year Advisors for support in anything to do with school life. As usual, our high expectations for behaviour, uniform and learning will be communicated and enforced.

It is vitally important for all students to be prepared for each day; correct uniform, all equipment including Maths calculator, pencil case, exercise books and laptop computer fully charged and most importantly a positive attitude toward learning. Teachers will indicate to students the requirements for each subject.

Students are encouraged to ride to school. There is a pushbike store area where students can lock their bikes. They MUST remember to follow all appropriate road rules and helmets are absolutely compulsory. It is unlawful for students to ride without a helmet.

Year 12 will be away at their 'Year 11' camp next week which was cancelled last year due to COVID. Fortunately, Crestwood was able to secure the Jindabyne Sport and Rec facility for the postponed camp. The students will be completing their compulsory Life Ready course and will be undertaking challenging activities, including the trek to the top of Mount Kosciuszko.

The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award is a voluntary enrichment program that invites young people to participate in a series of personal challenges over a period of time and receive recognition for completing these challenges. The challenges fall into 4 areas: Volunteering, Physical Recreation, Skill, and Adventurous Journey. Students are required to work independently in their own time to meet the requirements of each component. For this reason, possession of a Duke of Edinburgh's Award is held in high regard internationally and is very well recognised by potential employers. Following on from the success of previous years the Duke of Edinburgh's International Award will continue. In 2021, students will again complete expeditions across a range of venues. The aim of these expeditions is to develop and refine their cross-country navigation skills and achieve competencies in bush craft, first aid and camping. It is expected that these groups will continue to complete the other aspects of the award and achieve their awards throughout 2021. Numeracy lessons in Year 8

Numeracy involves students recognising and understanding the role of mathematics in daily life. It involves choosing and applying mathematical skills to solve problems in the world around us. Year 8 students have the opportunity once a fortnight to focus on

improving their numeracy skills.

Mystery of the Bones

1. The Scenario

The remains of four girls have been discovered in a recent archaeological find. There are four bones from each girl left but archaeologists don't know which bones belong together. You have been engaged as the mathematician to work out which bones belong to which girl and approximately how tall the girls were.

2. Background clues



By knowing the length of certain bones in the body, scientists can estimate a person's height. The bones used are the humerus (shoulder to elbow), radius (elbow to wrist), femur (thigh bone), or tibia (knee to ankle).

The formulas for approximate heights (in mm) for males and females are shown in this table:

Male height	Female height
2.9 x (Length of humerus) + 695	2.8 x (Length of humerus) + 704
3.3 x (Length of radius) + 846	3.3 x (Length of radius) + 800

Essential Equipment Needed in Maths

It is required all that students bring their essential equipment to every class so that they can make the most of the lessons. These items can be seen below

Drop Everything And Read!

DEAR at Crestwood High School

DEAR, an acronym for Drop Everything and Read, is continuing at Crestwood High School for the third year. Every Monday, Tuesday and Friday from 10:21 a.m. to 10: 34 a.m. every student and staff member is required to drop everything and read.

Why DEAR?

"If reading is to become a lifelong habit then young people must see themselves as participants in a community that views reading as a significant and enjoyable activity." Kathleen Moran

Fostering an environment where reading is seen as an important life skill, that is also enjoyable, is our core purpose in undertaking DEAR at Crestwood. The addition of thirty extra minutes of reading a week has been shown to have a significant impact on the reading levels of students. DEAR initiatives have also been responsible for increased library borrowing in schools. Furthermore, the modelling of reading by adults has been proven to have a positive influence on students. Many students have reported that they have continued to read their book at home for leisure as a result of the DEAR program.

How does DEAR work?

At the end of Period 2, a bell rings to indicate that students should pack up all other equipment and unpack their books from their bags. They then read silently until the next bell. The teacher also reads during this time to model good reading habits.

- Students are required to read a hard copy piece of literature, *NOT* their tablets, kindles or phones.
- All students are expected to bring a book for DEAR as it is part of their required materials for the day.
- Students read a book on their own, without interacting with the students around them. This will allow them to genuinely engage in the literature without distraction.

How can you support your child with DEAR?

- Remind them to take their book to school every Monday, Tuesday and Friday.
- Ask them about what they're reading, along with their joys and struggles.
- Talk about your own reading with them.
- Model reading by reading in front of them.

30 Jan 1835 – President Andrew Jackson survives the 1st assassination attempt on a US President.


30 Jan 1946 – The UN General Assembly meets for the first time.

I Feb I 587 – Elizabeth I, Queen of England, signs the Warrant of Execution for Mary Queen of Scots.


I Feb 1965 – Rev Martin Luther King Jr. and 770 others are arrested in protest against voter discrimination in Alabama.


3 Feb 1967 – Ronald Ryan, the last person in Australia to be <u>executed</u> for a crime, was hanged in Melbourne.
