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#### From The Principal ...

#### **NAPLAN 2021**

NAPLAN is the measure through which Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA), schools, teachers and parents can determine the literacy and numeracy skill level of students. Literacy and numeracy involve a range of skills that provide the critical foundation for learning across all key learning areas. It enables productive and rewarding participation in the school and the community building intellectual and communication skills for life.

The tests provide parents and schools with an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. They also provide schools with information about how education programs are working and which areas need to be prioritised for improvement.

NAPLAN tests are one aspect of each school's assessment and reporting process, and do not replace the extensive, ongoing assessments made by teachers about each student's learning in each subject area.

During this week our Year 7 and 9 students participated in NAPLAN assessments under formal exam conditions. All reports have indicated that our students have participated with diligence and respect demonstrating their understanding of the value of the NAPLAN process. The greatest value being the personalised information that the school and parents receive regarding the skill level of each student (at that point in time) and how this could inform future learning strategies and programs.

This is the last year that NAPLAN will be conducted as a written exam at Crestwood High School as the assessment will be delivered online from 2022.

Many thanks to Mr Peter Govan, Ms Amy Parker, Ms Tracey Cowan and Ms Phyllis O'Brien for your impeccable organisation and smooth management of NAPLAN during the week. I look forward to delivering our results including analysis and future directions later this year when the results are released.

#### **Bronze Duke of Edinburgh**

Twenty nine Year 9 students participated in their Bronze Duke Of Edinburgh Adventurous Journey. Along with Ms Osten and the guides from Youth Advance, the students spent time learning how to navigate using Silva compasses and topographic maps. There was considerable physical challenge; students carried everything that they needed.











Building tents, cooking and basic field craft were all components of the Adventurous Journey.

Students carried food, water, tents, wet weather and cold weather clothing. As you can see in the photos from the size of the packs, they were well provisioned! These Duke of Edinburgh students are also completing skills, physical recreation and community service components of the award.

Crestwood kicks off a new Bronze and Silver group at the start of each school year. Students need to be 14 years old for Bronze and 15 to commence the Silver award. The majority of equipment can be hired and there is a cost for each expedition.

## From The Deputy Principal ...

#### **NAPLAN**

Congratulations to Crestwood High School's Year 7 and 9 who completed the NAPLAN examinations this week. Many staff commented on the exemplary behaviour shown by our students as they completed these tasks. NAPLAN is a nationwide measure through which parents, teachers, schools, education authorities, governments and the broader community can determine whether or not young Australians are developing the literacy and numeracy skills that provide the critical foundation for other learning and for their productive and rewarding participation in the community.

NAPLAN is a point-in-time assessment that allows parents to see how their child is progressing against national standards in literacy and numeracy and over time. The tests provide an important contribution to monitoring and evaluating the performance of schools and school systems in these fundamental capabilities. They also provide schools with information about how education approaches are working, the areas to be prioritised for improvement, and those students requiring support in the teaching and learning of literacy and numeracy. The results assist teachers by providing additional information to support their professional judgement about students' levels of literacy and numeracy attainment and progress.

Thanks to Peter Govan, Tracey Cowan, Amy Parker, Phyllis O'Brien and all the teachers who helped conduct the examinations this week.

# From The Deputy Principal ...

#### **Instructional Leadership at Crestwood High**

As an instructional leader, my hands-on role in the first few months has been to provide professional learning to staff on a group and individual basis, lead discussions about student achievement and implications for teaching and planning practices and to coach and mentor staff. The development of data gathering, analysis and reporting has also been used constructively to guide the five key Action Teams to achieve their goals throughout the year. These Action Teams are pillars in achieving the school strategic goals.

A typical day might see me engaging in a variety of tasks, including:

- observing a teacher's lesson and providing feedback
- modelling a particular teaching strategy in a classroom
- observing a teacher working with a small group of students on a task and making a judgement about the skills and understanding demonstrated
- working with a group of teachers on a year level to analyse progress
- identify students at risk along with the appropriate level of intervention they may need
- working with a group of teachers to evaluate the success of their teaching programs or specific intervention strategies at a group and individual student level
- helping teachers plan for the next period of teaching
- providing professional learning for whole-school staff on topics of general relevance or specific need in relation to the Quality Teaching Model including how to engage students in ownership of their learning.

My aim is to develop and share structures and routines to ensure that they can impact on all classrooms on a regular and timely basis. As mentioned in my first article, my role is to build teacher capacity; challenge existing pedagogy and facilitate staff to make the transition towards evidence-based decision-making in their planning and practice.

My vision for this role throughout the year is to facilitate a greater uptake of the concepts of differentiated teaching and personalised learning, engender a more explicit approach to teaching literacy and numeracy, provide more frequent opportunities for students to practise key concepts or skills and to receive direct feedback on their progress which impacts positively on their levels of engagement during learning. I am really enjoying this role particularly because of its potential to directly influence the quality of teaching that occurs within the classroom and its resultant positive impact on student learning outcomes.

## **Competitions in Science!**

This year, the Science faculty is offering students the opportunity to participate in 3 national competitions testing their knowledge, understanding and application of scientific concepts and principles. The 3 competitions available to students this year are:


- \* the Big Science Competition
- \* the Science Olympiads
- \* the ICAS Science exam

Each of these offer their own challenges and rewards, and we encourage our students to take a chance and give each competition a go. You never know – you may find an interest in a field of Science that you hadn't previously considered!



#### Big Science Competition

The Big Science Competition will take place in week 5 of Term 2 (next week!) and is open to students in Years 7-10. The competition asks students questions about the concepts they have learnt about in their current syllabus, as well as a few unknowns to see how well they can apply the knowledge and understanding they have acquired. It is an online, 30 multiple choice question exam and this year, it is FREE to participate! Last year, we had an outstanding result of 100% correct in this competition from one of our Year 7 students, so let's see if our competitors this year can match that excellent effort!



#### Olympiad Exams

The Olympiads are broken down into

subjects – Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Earth & Environmental Sciences. These exams are only open to Year 10 and 11 students and are invite-only. For Year 10 students, the Olympaid challenges them to put all their accumulated knowledge of Science to the test and includes some material from the Stage 6 Science syllabuses. For Year 11 students, the Olympiads are for students who have shown excellence or promising results in their Stage 6 courses. The Olympiad exams are invite-only as they act as a screening panel for the International Science Olympiad, which is an extremely prestigious and competitive event that occurs once a year. Only 30 students are selected to complete the pre-competition training camp from the top 1% of competitors nation-wide, with only 5 making it to the International Team, where they represent Australia against the other competing countries! Last year, we were extremely proud of our Year 11 competitors, all of whom achieved an excellent result. We had 1 student who was invited to attend the summer training camp, which is a most amazing effort!

The Olympiad Exams will take place in July – keep an eye out for invitations coming towards the end of Term 2. The cost is \$15 per student – we hope all invited students chose to participate!



#### **ICAS Science Exam**


The ICAS Science Exam is run by the University of New South Wales and is designed to challenge students in their knowledge and application of scientific principles and concepts to unfamiliar and difficult questions. As UNSW runs an assortment of exams, the Science one being part of it, students will be competing against students from around the world in their age groups. It is an opportunity for our budding Scientists to showcase their abilities – we highly encourage all students to participate showing their love of Science!

The ICAS Science exam will take place in August, so notes will be handed out at the start of Term 3. It is \$17.05 per student to participate in the exam, which can be paid directly through the ICAS website Parent Portal when we start organising the exam.

# RSL AND SCHOOLS REMEMBER ANZAC DAY COMMEREMORATION SERVICE

# Visual Arts

Earlier this term Year 11, 12 and the Support Unit went to see ARTEXPRESS at The Armoury. ARTEXPRESS is an annual series of exhibitions of exemplary artworks created by New South Wales Visual Arts students for the Higher School Certificate examination.

From gaining inspiration Year 11 students have been looking at experimenting within different media areas and using simple materials to create expressive artworks.

This week we focused on printmaking using only acrylic paint and dishwashing liquid on the desk to then create a monoprint.





# Mathematical Musings



This week in Mathematical Musings we have some challenge questions for you:

- 3. Which letters of the alphabet are not used when writing all the numbers from 1 to 99 in words?
- 4. Which numbers less than 100 are the only numbers where, when written in letters, the letters are arranged in alphabetical order and reverse alphabetical order?
- 5. Which two equations (written in words) that have an answer of 13 are anagrams of each other?

Once again, the English Department hosted Crestwood's annual 'Pop Up Poetry Day'! Competitions were held throughout the day so that students across all grades had opportunities to win prizes for their creativity and innovation. Also, the best poems will be entered in the Dorothea Mackellar Poetry Competition! Winners will be announced very soon!

On this day students were asked to use the Google Classroom Poetry Competition page to show their knowledge of poetry through quick poetry trivia questions or by formally submitting their poems into the junior and senior categories. One of the fun competitions included 'Magnetic Poetry' where students used an online website to help them create a three stanza poem with the words presented onscreen. Another competition students were asked to engage with was 'Book Spine Poetry' where they had to create a poem entirely from book titles.

#### **Public Speaking and Debating**

On Thursday 6<sup>th</sup> May Crestwood hosted the Plain English Public Speaking Competition. Students from Crestwood, Parramatta Marist, Kellyville, Model Farms, Girraween and the Australian International Academy presented thought provoking prepared and impromptu speeches.

Sajnoor Rana from Crestwood, Nathan Khoury from Parramatta Marist and Zac Oliver from Kellyville High School have made it into the regional final.

Our very own Tomas Cvetkovski came very close with a "superb and beautifully structured speech" as stated by the adjudicator.

Additionally, Sajnoor's speech on 'conspiracy theories' and 'misinformation' was presented to the junior assembly on Monday morning and Tomas presented to the senior assembly his highly engaging speech on the 'Inequality Among Us - tackling the appointment of Linda Reynolds as Minister for the NDIS.'

Crestwood is definitely very proud of their efforts!









#### **Regional Shakespeare Carnival**

Last night, five Year 10 students represented
Crestwood High School in Sport For Jove's regional
Shakespeare Carnival hosted by Jamison High
School. The group consisted of Selin Bayraktar,
Katie Harrison, Jordyn Jelicich, Alyssa Marks and
Ellie Mathews. As a part of their entry, the group
devised their own modern, original 7 minute piece
inspired by both Romeo and Juliet and The Taming
of the Shrew—not an easy feat! A lot of time was
put in by the students at lunch time, recess and



after school to ensure their performance was full of nods to Shakespeare's works including mistaken identity, love, witty one liners and of course the famous balcony scene. The team performed extremely well despite their nerves (some of the students had never even had the opportunity to perform for such a large audience thanks to 2020!) and had an absolutely amazing time. They received the only special mention of the night and were highly commended for having the greatest closing line the judges had seen in the history of the competition! 
## SRC - Crestwood Staff Appreciation

# HSIE Happenings

#### This fortnight in History... 14 - 27

14 May 1607 – The 1<sup>st</sup> permanent English settlement in North America was established at Jamestown, Virginia.

14 May 1796 – Smallpox vaccine was developed.

17 May 1859 – AFL first 'laws of the game' published.

18 May 1804 – Napoleon Bonaparte became Emperor of France, snatching the crown from the hands of Pope Pius VII during the coronation ceremony and then crowned himself.

## What's That App?

As part of the new Industrial Multimedia curriculum in Stage 5, students have been learning about how to design and develop their own application. Year 10 were set the brief of developing an application about gaming. Students have currently completed the design and animation of an original logo and are about to begin learning how to program interactions in their application. During the design and animation of their logos students were challenged to apply the elements and principles of design whilst using Adobe Illustrator and After Effects. Below are some examples of the Year 10 students' original logos.
