From The Principal ...

National Sorry Day - More than a word



National Sorry Day is held on May 26 each year and marks the day that the landmark 'Bringing them Home' report was tabled in federal parliament in 1997. It is a time to remember the past policies of forced child removal, and reflect on the sad and painful stories of the Stolen Generations. It is a time to remember the impact

of past decisions and practices that denied Aboriginal children the education that all other children in NSW were entitled to and how this has had a rippled effect through generations. It is a time to recognise the resilience of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander

peoples and the power of saying Sorry.

As difficult as saying sorry can be, it is the first important step to reconciliation that acknowledges impact of actions. When genuinely expressed, the word sorry also carries the empathy and intention to improve circumstances through action and commitment. In many discussions I have had with students over the years, I have always advocated that saying sorry is important but what you do after saying sorry matters more.

One of the greatest responsibilities presented to education today is improving Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander educational outcomes while supporting connection to culture. This includes improving the proportion of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students completing year 12, exploring their full potential and ensuring it is comparable to non-indigenous students.

National Reconciliation Week follows

directly after National Sorry Day. It is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.



The week runs from 27 May to 3 June every

year. These dates commemorate two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey – the successful 1967 referendum and the High Court Mabo decision. From The Deputy Principal ...

I would like to acknowledge the efforts of Mr Govan and his team, for their hard work in co-ordinating and administering the NAPLAN Examination to all students in Years 7 and 9. I would also like to congratulate the students who conducted themselves with respect and diligence throughout the whole process. We eagerly await the results with the understanding that those students who perform below expectations, will be supported in taking future online tests. Mrs Parker, who led the supervision in the hall reported back that Year 9 behaviour was exceptional. Congratulations Year 9 and thank you Mrs Parker.

The NSW Education and Standards Authority set minimum standards for students to achieve credentials such as the Record of School Achievement (RoSA) and the Higher School Certificate (HSC). If students do not complete course requirements, they will receive an 'N' determination. Students are warned via a letter from the school ('N' determination Warning Letter) if it looks like they might receive an 'N' determination. This aims to give the student time to complete the course requirements and rectify the problem. If a student receives an 'N' determination in a mandatory curriculum requirement course, they will not be eligible for the RoSA. If they leave school, they will receive a Transcript of Study that will list the mandatory course(s) that received an 'N' determination. If a student is given an 'N' determination in a non-mandatory course, the course will not appear on their RoSA or Transcript of Study.

For students studying their HSC, an 'N' Determination Warning indicates they are not satisfying course requirements and list the areas that need to be addressed. If students do not act on these warnings they risk losing their HSC.

The rules around assessment and the procedures for getting assessment tasks completed appropriately and on time are outlined in the assessment guidelines booklet. Students must satisfactorily complete the course they are enrolled in.

Satisfactory completion of a course means the student has:

- Applied himself/herself with <u>diligence</u> and <u>sustained effort</u> to the set tasks and experiences provided in the course by the school
- ♦ Satisfactorily achieved course outcomes
- Met the NSW Educational Standards Authority (NESA) requirement for satisfactory attendance. In this school attendance of 85% of programmed lesson time for a course is considered satisfactory. Should attendance fall below this level the Principal may determine that the course criteria has not been met.

All work presented in assessment tasks and examinations (including submitted works and practical examinations) must be the student's own or must be acknowledged appropriately. Malpractice, including plagiarism, could lead to you receiving zero marks for the task or examination, and will jeopardise your results.

Malpractice is any activity that allows you to gain an unfair advantage over other students. It includes, but is not limited to:

From The Deputy Principal ...

- copying someone else's work in part or in whole, and presenting it as your own
- using material directly from books, journals, CDs or the internet without reference to the source
- building on the ideas of another person without reference to the source
- buying, stealing or borrowing another person's work and presenting it as your own
- submitting work that another person, such as a parent, coach or subject expert, has contributed to substantially
- using words, ideas, designs or the work of others in practical and performance tasks without appropriate acknowledgement
- paying someone to write or prepare material
- breaching school examination rules
- cheating in an examination
- using non-approved aids during an assessment task
- contriving false explanations to explain work not handed in by the due date
- assisting another student to engage in malpractice.
- not attending all timetables lessons without approval on the day of assessment

In the case of suspected plagiarism, students will be required to provide evidence that all unacknowledged work is entirely their own. Such evidence might include, but is not limited to, the student:

- providing evidence of and explaining the process of their work, which might include diaries, journals or notes, working plans or sketches, and progressive drafts to show the development of their ideas
- Answering questions regarding the assessment task, examination or submitted work under investigation, to demonstrate their knowledge, understanding and skills.

If you or your child has any doubts about their assignments they MUST speak to the teacher as soon as possible to work through solutions.

Building Upgrades

The continual process of upgrading our facilities continues. The original walkway covers are being replaced to rectify the issues of rotting timbers on the 40-year-old structures. Students have been wonderful during this time, avoiding the various and ever changing safety fencing. The upgraded metal covers will be 'light-filled' and waterproof. It is expected that these works will be completed by mid term 3. Other projects are expected to begin once the walkway covers are completed. Warren Groth, DP

Mathematical Musings

Fractions are widely used in daily life, for example, splitting a bill while eating at a restaurant, following a recipe while cooking, calculating a discount when shopping, making cocktails while drinking etc. What are fractions? In short, a fraction is a part of a whole. For example, a cake is divided into 8 equal slices. If a single slice is eaten, how can we represent the remaining portion of the cake? The remaining portion of the cake can be expressed

numerically as %.



Fractions are an elementary topic in mathematics that act as a building block in many other mathematics topics. Year 7 students are currently studying Fractions and Decimals. Students are engaged in solving a problem involving fractions.


The judges also chose an overall junior and senior winner. Each will have their poem entered in the Dorothea Mackellar Poetry Competition.



This fortnight in History...


- 28 May 1961 Amnesty International was founded, this year marks 60 years.

Year 9 History Elective...

The class is currently studying the ancient Celts. As part of learning about this society, Year 9 spent time learning and researching ancient Celtic art forms.

In the last edition of Infoline we shared how Year 8 have been putting their critical thinking skills to work on solving the case of the Crestwood Canteen Heist. After reviewing evidence such as fingerprints and shoeprints found on site and examining six suspects, we can finally reveal that culprit of the Canteen Heist is: Mr Lam.



This is an extract from Hon. Detective Harini Murigipudi's findings:

I believe that Mr Lam was the culprit for stealing the documents and the food as he had a massive debt of \$80 (motive) and he may have just stolen the food since his request for more food for the active staff. I believe that Mr Johnstone is completely innocent, as he was just checking the security, and left straight after his security check. We conclude with Hon. Detective Faiz Lalani's findings:

I firmly believe that Mr Lam is the perpetrator of the theft at the CHS canteen. Mr Lam had a perfect opportunity to commit the crime, between 4:00 and 4:30. Additionally, Mr Lam has no way to prove his alibi, which was mowing the lawn in his backyard and he claims that he was not there on the day of the crime. Moreover, he strongly denied a statement in the record which was about him requesting more food to be available for staff who are more active at school.

Robotics and Automated Systems

Robotics is an interdisciplinary field that integrates computer science and engineering. Robotics involves the design, construction, operation, and the use of robots. The goal of robotics is to design machines that help and assist humans.

For part of Information and Software Technology subject at Crestwood High School students have been studying how robots have developed and how they are present in everyday life to assist the way things are manufactured and businesses operate.


Students have researched the use of robotics in automated systems such as Baggage Handling at airports, robotic welders in the manufacturing of cars and how robots work in the Amazon warehouse to enable quick response shipping of purchased goods.



Students completed the Amazon Cyber Robotics Challenge that asked students to program the robots called Hercules to efficiently pick up and deliver Pods to where a human can pick out products purchased ready to be packed for shipping. These robots have cut times by over 50% for the delivery of Amazon products. Below are some pictures of the Software used to complete this challenge.
