From The Deputy Principal ...

The importance of school reports.

Excellent performance! More effort needed! The student needs to devote more time and attention to academic outcomes, or they can improve by concentrating on revising the TEEL paragraph writing structures. These are some of the common remarks written by teachers on students' reports at the end of each semester.

As our students break for the end of semester one, I encourage you to spend time reviewing the report with your student.

What to look out for from a Crestwood High School report

Each semester's report provides you with a snapshot of the progress of your student. The report is divided into a number of sections. The personal profile enables you to see a teacher's assessment of your student's attitude to their work at Crestwood. It includes such areas as bringing appropriate equipment, punctuality and respect for peers and teachers. The personal profile section is an inciteful window into the work ethics displayed by your student.

The profile uses descriptors such as always, often, sometimes and rarely. These are used to evaluate your student in each particular area. Reports provide parents and caregivers with the ability to reflect on the progress of your student. Working through the report with your student enables you to open up discussions about future career or further study options. It enables you to start setting goals and making plans for the future.

The outcomes section of the report measures student progress against the skills and content knowledge required in that specific subject. Each outcome is assessed from A, which is outstanding progress through to E which is reflecting limited progress. Course results provide parents with a mid-year and final year grade. This reflects student achievement across a range of assessment tasks

which formally assess the skills and content that are specific to the course. This is also reflected in most subjects by a Box and Whisker Plot. This is a way of visually displaying a range of information.

After you have downloaded the report from Sentral use it to brainstorm with your student, how you can support your child's learning. When you read the report instead of focusing just on grades, focus on what your child loves, how they learn, and what may be a struggle for them.

Crestwood is no longer printing reports, instead they are available via the parent portal. If you are unsure about how to download the report please contact the school. Remember that once your student leaves Crestwood you will lose access to the student portal so store the reports in a safe place.

As the term holidays are close we hope that you have both a safe and happy break.


Mathematical Musings

As Students in Years 7 to 10 start to receive the results of their 2nd assessment task in Maths for the year it is important to consider what the results are telling you. How can you use the feedback from your teachers to continue to grow your mathematical skills? Some ideas include:

- Go through your test paper and consider if you lost marks because of a silly mistake, not reading the question properly or because you didn't understand the content?
- Use the solutions provided by your teachers and reattempt those questions you lost marks on.
- Seek additional help by attending Monday maths in Room 32 at lunchtime.
- Use Mathspace to practice those concepts where you struggled in the task.

Remember if you don't practice the skill it won't magically improve.

Working Mathematically is a skill that also needs practice—usually in breaking down a worded problem. It is at the core of what we learn as Mathematics students and allows us to solve real life problems.



Here are some Maths riddles for you to practice this skill—note that the numbers involved are not complicated.

- 1. If four men can build four tables in four hours, how many tables can eight men build in eight hours?
- 2. In an alien land far away, half of 10 is 6. If the same proportion holds true then what is 1/6th of 30 in this alien land?
- 3. If I borrow \$50 from my mum and \$50 from my dad that's \$100. If I buy a shirt that's \$97, I have \$3 change which I give \$1 to my mum and \$1 to my dad, leaving me with \$1. This means I own my mum \$49 and my dad \$49, which together is \$98, plus the \$1 kept makes \$99. Where is the other dollar?

Year 10 Excursion to "The 7 Stages of Grieving"



This term, Year 10 has been studying *The Seven Stages of Grieving* by Deborah Mailman and Wesley Enoch as a part of their Indigenous Australian Theatre unit and they were lucky enough to have the opportunity to see a live production of this play performance at Sydney Theatre Company. For some, this was their first ever experience of live theatre and it certainly did not disappoint! 



16 June 1884 – The 1st purpose-built roller coaster, the "Switchback Railway" opens in New York's Coney Island amusement park.


17 June 1944 – Iceland declares itself independent from Denmark and becomes a republic.


It is highly recommended all students attend this incursion to gain **greater confidence and knowledge** in understanding and applying the QANTAS case study, as a necessary part of the extended response.







Stage 5 - Building and Construction

This term, students in the Stage 5 Building and Construction class have been completing a unit of work on the stages of house construction. Currently the class is making a scaled wall frame that will eventually make one of the walls of a bird





house. Students are developing an understanding of the components that go together to make a wall frame such as the top and bottom plates, studs and noggings. To make the frame students need learn to interpret dimensioned drawings

and use tools including saws, chisels and mallets to cut housing joints. They will also be learning about different cladding materials, roof trusses and roofing materials. In the coming weeks students will learn to lay bricks and pour a small concrete slab to make a paver.

Choosing a VET Course is it right for me?

What is TVET?

All TVET courses help you build practical skills and industry-specific knowledge, and count toward your school outcome, with some courses contributing towards an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR).

TVET stands for TAFE-Delivered Vocational Education and Training. TVET provides an opportunity to study a TAFE NSW course while still at school.

What are the Benefits of TVET?

INTEREST

Study something you're interested in.

EXPERIENCE

Learn from industry experienced teachers.

INSIGHT

Gain insight into industry areas to help you with your career decisions.

SKILLS

Develop employer recognised skills and experience.

INDEPENDENCE

Develop independence and confidence in an adult learning environment.

PATHWAYS

Potentially gain credit from your course towards further study.

How TVET courses can be delivered

TVET courses have the same NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) requirements as other HSC courses, meaning you will need to regularly attend classes and complete the set assessments. Most courses take between one and two years to complete and some classes may also extend outside of school hours and/or include work placement.


Some TVET and EVET courses are delivered in different forms including: weekly sessions - one afternoon a week, BLOCK (1 week during each holiday period), digital (online) and virtual (mixture of online, podcasts and zoom sessions).

What is work placement?

Work placement is a mandatory requirement for many VET courses. It gives you the chance to learn new skills and apply the skills you've already learned as part of your course in a real industry setting.

Work placement will help you to:

- Gain insights into the kind of career you'd like to have
- Make informed decisions about further training and study
- Become more employable



TAFE NSW will source work placement opportunities for you or you can suggest an employer and we can support you in working to secure a placement with them.


How your TVET course contributes towards your future study and career goals

If you successfully undertake TVET at school and want to continue your studies at TAFE NSW, you would be eligible for credit in any course containing the units of competency you have completed during your TVET studies. This means that you will not need to repeat any subjects that you successfully completed as part of your TVET course

How to apply for a TVET course?

EVET COURSES TIMELINE AND APPLICATION PROCESS FOR YEARS 10 & 11

Crestwood High School accesses external courses as part of the course offers for Years 11 & 12. Application procedures for courses can be a little confusing due to the many providers involved and the different application dates and procedures. A timeline and procedures flowchart is provided below.

Important Note

It is important that parents understand that without the completed paperwork including all boxes ticked and signatures provided, the paperwork can't be submitted. The earlier the paperwork is submitted before the due date the easier it is to rectify any problems with the paperwork prior to submission. Below is an outline of the process:

REBRIN

COURSE APPLICATION PAPER TRAIL

Students collect course information and application forms

Student collect paperwork from Mrs Fisher (Library). Paperwork includes information sheet and application forms. Paperwork can be collected Term 2. An electronic copy is also emailed to parents and students.

TWO: **Information Sessions**

Some courses require an information session. Students will be informed of information

evenings.

THREE: Submission of forms - Due between Term 3/ Week 6: 20th August 2022

All students must complete all aspects of the application forms. This includes the Unique Student Identifier (USI), including the section that indicates what form of ID the student used and providing a copy of proof of the creation of the USI. Without this information the student can not be placed on the USI registry and therefore can not be accepted into the course.

Please note late applications can not be guaranteed to be considered in the first round.

FOUR: Offers / Acceptance / withdrawal – Offers: 25/10/21- 26/11/21 (Term 4: Weeks 4 - 8)

All offers will be made by Friday 26th November 2021. All students must accept or withdraw their offer. Once the offer is accepted a student may withdraw up to 3rd February 2022. After this date if a student withdraws the student is still considered part of this course for the year and declared as accepted and will become billable on 4th February 2022.

Note: Students who choose not to continue from their Preliminary (Year 11) into the HSC

course must also submit a withdrawal form or will be billed for their HSC course.

Final Acceptance conditions - Friday 26th November 2021 FIVE:

Students must complete all of the application forms required from the organization and submit them to Mrs Fisher. Forms must be checked and sent to the organisation on request. These forms can be submitted in anticipation of an acceptance with students EOI in Term 3. No

position is deemed accepted without all final paperwork provided.

Should I drop maths for Year 11?

This article could be a good starting point if you have a child who is thinking about dropping maths. This is a question I get asked a lot by senior students. I always get them to ask themselves a few questions first. They might be surprised at how important maths is to the career they would like to end up in.

Should I drop maths? By Fran Molloy



Should I drop maths? Ask yourself these questions first.

1. Do you know for sure that your career won't need maths? Y/N

Studying maths seriously prepares you for any career. It's great for developing excellent problem-solving skills and thinking critically. You'll be amazed to find out how mathematically trained people use what they know in almost every field you could possibly think of.

2. Have you got the basic maths skills you need? Y/N

Whether you want to finish maths in high school or take it all the way to a PhD, you need to build the basics first. Maths at school is taught in sequences to help it all make sense; if you skip any of the groundwork you may be in trouble later.

But don't stress if you didn't do high-level maths at school and still want to go to uni. Most universities offer bridging courses to help you get to HSC-level maths to be able to continue your studies.

3. Want to work for a cool coding company one day? Y/N

Many of the fastest-growing careers – particularly in technology – value maths skills. "Data literacy is more important than ever: just knowing Excel doesn't do it anymore," says UNSW Sydney statistics fellow Peter Straka, who recommends budding mathematicians also get to know some code programs such as Python or R. You can also try a free online resource like Khan Academy, Math Planet and Math Warehouse to up your maths skills.

Still asking yourself Should I drop maths?... Keep reading to see how these mad maths skills get put to use.

1. Get cooking

MasterChef fans everywhere know how important it is to get a recipe right. "I use maths all day, every day," says Ashlie Manganaro, an apprentice chef at Bluetrain restaurant in Melbourne. In her job she measures portions, calculates meal costs and converts measurements.





2. Build games

Kevin Chan is the technical director of games studio, Robot Circus. He went into game development after getting his software engineering degree at the University of Melbourne. Software engineers use maths skills to reason with abstract objects and structures.

3. Pilot the skies

Royal Australian Air Force fighter test pilot Peter Tippner flies high in the sky. His Bachelor of Science (double major in science and maths) gets a workout when he uses geometry and trigonometry to assess flight courses, while direction compasses help Peter calculate angles and avoid hazards.





4. Start a business

Matt Bullock, head of Spinify, is one successful guy. He completed a Bachelor of Computer Science (majoring in mathematics) at the University of Wollongong before starting online payment gateway eWAY and Spinify. This platform – based on 'game theory' – utilises high-level maths, statistics and probability to motivate sales staff.

5. Be a human rights champ

Field statistician Romesh Silva did a Bachelor of Science and German Studies double degree, majoring in maths, at UNSW Sydney before turning his expertise to human rights issues. Romesh now uses technology and statistics at the Human Rights Data Analysis Group in San Francisco to quantify human rights abuses.


Steps to UNI for Year 10 Students - UAC Booklet

Students in Year 10 have received a paper copy and an electronic version of the UAC's Book: Steps to Uni for Year 10 Students which will help them choose courses for Years 11 and 12 in preparation for tertiary study in 2024.

Year 10: a year of decisions

If you plan to apply for tertiary study you should select HSC courses that keep the doors open for entry to a range of tertiary courses.

This booklet is for Year 10 students choosing their subjects for years 11 and 12. Its aim is to help you think about the next two years and beyond and provide information so that you can make the best decisions for successful study in senior school and beyond. In Year 10



students will choose the subjects that they will study for the next two years. Although there are many pathways to university or college, choosing the right courses at school can make it easier to enter and succeed at tertiary study.

In this booklet, UAC's participating institutions have listed the areas of study that they plan to offer for 2024 admissions. They have also set out course entry requirements and, where applicable, details of:

- course prerequisites
- subject prerequisites
- assumed knowledge

- recommended studies
- additional selection criteria.

While New South Wales institutions do not have a lot of prerequisites (this is changing), many do specify assumed knowledge and recommended studies. This is important information to consider when choosing subjects to study in years 11 and 12. Institutions do offer bridging courses if these standards are not met, however, bridging courses are not equivalent to the two-year HSC course and they may add significantly to your workload.

This booklet also provides information about HSC courses, how the ATAR is calculated and used for tertiary entry, and how bonus points work. There are worksheets to help students think about what they like and what you're good at, and to guide you through the steps involved in choosing your subjects for years 11 and 12. If they are still not sure about the exact career path they want to follow, this booklet can help them choose subjects which will keep their options open and give them the best chance of succeeding in the future. If your child is considering going onto Year 11 and 12 and University, then this booklet will help them to decide the best subjects to choose.
