Teacher professional learning (TPL) is an integral part of quality teaching at Crestwood High School. Professional learning helps teachers gain insight into and knowledge of their craft. It encourages the development of new ways of thinking about content and new approaches to teaching. This substantively affects student achievement over a sustained period of time. Changes in teaching practice and improved student achievement need to be observed and measured.



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NEWS FROM ENGLISH

Professional learning can be both internal and external. External opportunities involve teachers going off site to a venue where an expert or specialist delivers content knowledge. Internal professional learning occurs at school, often involving a number of colleagues to build capacity. In implementing changed practice, teachers acquire new knowledge, modify their existing beliefs and attitudes in relation to their teaching and sustain that change over time. This change in teaching practice needs to correlate strongly with the improvement of specified student outcomes.

On Thursday the 9th March, the first of eight breakfast sessions on High Potential Gifted Education (HPGE) was held at school in the Common Room from 8 - 8.30 am. Neighbouring colleagues from primary and high schools were invited to participate. The workshops include topics on higher order thinking, creative & critical thinking and authenticity. These sessions will provide teachers with explicit goals and practical tools for working effectively with HPGE students and classes. The series is designed to be interactive, with participants applying their learning and sharing resources and pedagogy. Below are photos of participants for the first session.

Welfare News

Sleep research from the past 20 years indicates that sleep does more than simply give students the energy they need to study and perform well on tests. Sleep helps students learn, memorise, retain, recall, and use their new knowledge to come up with creative and innovative solutions. Getting consistent sleep is vital for adolescents whose brains are growing at a rapid pace. Without enough sleep children and adolescents have problems with attention, memory and problem-solving. Research has continuously shown that sleep deprivation can also contribute to emotional dysregulation and behaviour problems.

Making sleep a priority is important for parents who want their child to be happy and be able to cope with life's stressors. The average sleep for teens is 8-10 hrs per day. Below are a few free apps that can help build a healthy sleeping routine for your child.

SLEEP HYGIENE

Effective Apps to establish healthy sleeping habits





<u>Sleep Ninja</u>

- Educates young people about the role of sleep and its importance
- Helps students become aware of habits that contribute to poor sleep (for example, sleep environment, daytime routine, bedtime routine)
- Teaches behavioural and cognitive strategies to change unhelpful sleep patterns

<u>Calm App</u>

The app provides exercises, breathing techniques, music, and bedtime stories for people who are tense, feel anxious, or want to improve quality of their sleep.

Crestwood High School will be using the Sentral for Parents App to communicate with parents about everything that is happening at school. You will still be able to access your account using a web browser version (Chrome, Edge).

The Sentral for Parents app will allow families to:

- send and receive messages from your child's/children's teachers
- view calendar events
- view academic reports
- explain past absences
- request future absences (must include detailed comment as approval is required based on the reasons given)
- book parent interviews
- receive sick bay notifications
- view school newsletters
- update their details

as well as receive real-time notifications and messages from the school.

Accessing the Sentral for Parent App is simple. Download it from the Apple App Store or Google Play Store.



Once you have downloaded the app simply register, verify your email address, login and connect to your child.

You will then receive notifications to your phone from Crestwood High School related directly to your child/ren.

How can I get ready for NAPLAN?

Use the demonstration tests to practise the types of questions and tools available in the online tests. Access the demonstration tests here: <u>https://www.nap.edu.au/online-assessment/public-demonstration-site</u>





Can I use my own calculator for the numeracy test?

No. The online numeracy test will have an on-screen calculator. Try the NAPLAN online calculator in the numeracy demonstration tests on the public demonstration site.

Do I need to touch type?

No. You do not need to be able to touch type to complete the tests.





What is tailored testing?

The test will change depending on your performance in the test. Questions get easier or harder based on your answers.

Conventions of language test important information

A message will appear on your device to let you know you have finished the spelling section of the test.

Check your answers before selecting 'Yes, I want to start the next section'.

After you select 'Yes, I want to start the next section', the grammar and punctuation section will start. You will **not** be able to go back to the spelling section of the test.

What was happening in the English block this week?

The Crestwood Debating Club workshops commenced for 2023! It was very pleasing to welcome 25 enthusiastic students from years 7 – 10. The workshops take place on Tuesday afternoons from 3 – 4pm in the English block. Next week onwards, Aleina Konsam, an ex-Crestwood student with debating and adjudicating experience, will be leading the workshops. Ms. Leung and Ms. Ebrahimi will continue supervising the sessions.

The weekly workshops will assist students in honing their debating and public speaking skills as they prepare for the Premier's Debating Challenge. Based on the students' progress in the workshops, they will be selected to represent the school in its official debating teams for years 7 - 10. There are typically four people in a team and the other students from the Debating Club often take the role of chairperson or substitute when team members are absent.

The Year 11 team will be commencing their first round of the Premier's Debating Challenge on Monday 13th March. The students, Kiara Kanchan, Aneesh Upadhyaya, Tijana Bunjevac and Armaan Gill will be debating against Northmead Creative and Performing Arts High School via Zoom.

The Premier's Debating Challenge for Years 7 – 10 will be commencing in term two.

Following the success of Ysabella Atay-Brito and Rowan Myers reaching the state final stages last year in public speaking competitions, we are looking forward to another fantastic year of public speaking and debating in 2023.





Past student recognised for traineeship achievement

Past student Madeleine Hughes, was recognised at a special ceremony held at Ultimo TAFE and jointly hosted by TAFE NSW and School Infrastructure NSW (SINSW). The 1 March 2023 event marked the completion of a two year NSW Government Infrastructure Traineeship program for over 70 trainees from the first cohort of 2021, including Madeleine.



The NSW Government Infrastructure Traineeship program, managed by School Infrastructure NSW and the Construction Leadership Group, supports Year 12 school leavers with employment in the infrastructure sector while they continue their study.

The program is a partnership, bringing government and industry together to deliver career options in the infrastructure sector for school leavers. Trainees combine study for a Certificate IV TAFE qualification and work in government and industry infrastructure projects. Trainees complete three eight-month rotations of work placements across three different government, industry and contractor positions.

Year 10 assignments were issued on Monday this week. Students have two weeks to do some research according to their task instructions then apply the knowledge and skills learnt to complete the assignments. All assignments are due by 8.30am on Monday 20th March.



Problem solving skills



The ability to solve problems is a basic life skill which is essential to our day-to-day lives. People solve problems everyday without really thinking about how they solve them. For example, you drive to work everyday but one morning your car breaks down. What do you do?

There are lots of possible solutions. You can take public transport. You might ask a friend to give you a lift. You may take a taxi, or you might decide to walk if it is not too far. There is no right way to solve this problem and different people will solve it differently.

Problem solving skills are the ability to identify problems, develop possible solutions and take the appropriate course of action. Just like any other skill, the more you practise, the better you get. Difficulties with problem solving can often be a reason for frustration or losing interest in studying which can lead to poor academic performance. In Maths classes, students are encouraged to independently identify problems and think of possible solutions.

Monday Lunch Study Group

The Mathematics faculty continues to run a Monday Lunch Study Group in room 29. Any students who have difficulty with their homework and need additional help from Maths teachers can come to room 29 on Mondays at lunch time. Students will be supervised by a member from the Maths faculty. The teacher will help students with their homework, answer their questions and provide addditional support and explanations when needed.

early entry quick facts



Last year saw a huge surge in early entry applications for students looking to get into university, so if you're thinking of heading off to uni in 2024, you might be keen to get started now.

Many early entry programs tend to open up for applications between April and June. And while you might hear back from some universities pretty quickly, for many of them you'll be waiting until at least September to receive an offer.

It's important to keep in mind that if you do receive an offer you may still need to meet certain requirements to keep it, like finishing Year 12 and receiving an ATAR.



We expect there to be 47 programs on offer in 2023, up from 44 in 2022

ONE THIRD OF OFFERS WERE EARLY ENTRY

At least **50,000 early offers** were made to Year 12 students in NSW, compared to over **95,000 offers** made through UAC's standard application process



34 UNIVERSITIES

There are 42 universities in Australia, and 34 of them have an early entry program in 2022

18 of the early entry programs promised students would receive an offer within 2 weeks of applying
