Crestwood High has three Anti-Racism Contact Officer's (ARCO) who are trained to assist with countering racism and supporting the school community when making complaints of racism in schools. Another staff member is about to participate in the ARCO training. A key aspect of their role is to promote anti-racism education. This is done by:

*providing advice on incorporating whole school antiracism education strategies in school planning;

* building awareness of the impact of racism on social cohesion, student learning and wellbeing;

* promoting upstander responses to incidents of racism for staff and students; addressing complaints of racism involving students through approaches such as restorative practice which promote respectful behaviours; monitoring incidents of racism.

The most effective strategies for countering racism are typically those which are integrated into whole school approaches and regular school routines and those which are proactive in creating a school culture of high expectations, equity and respect. Evidence also shows that the first step in countering racism is learning how to recognise it and understanding its impact on individuals, systems and communities. We are committed to maintaining a positive school environment in which all forms of racism are rejected.

115 students sat for an average of five exams each, writing countless essays, short and extended responses and completing thousands of equations and calculations.



Welcome to the 2024 HSC course!

To assist students to use their time effectively, CHS has introduced a memorandum that outlines how the Library can and should be used. Seeing good study habits from the start reduces stress and creates a level of success that encourages further work and study. All students who have study periods will be required to sign the memorandum.

Experience suggests that those students who use their time well will find the HSC far less stressful and achieve more, giving themselves options at the end of their course in 2024.



Discuss these with your student. Help them get organised and apply themselves to some of the following tips and advice.

Time Management: Create a study schedule that breaks down your workload into manageable chunks. Allocate specific times for each subject and take regular breaks to avoid burnout.

Healthy Lifestyle: Ensure you get enough sleep, exercise regularly, and maintain a balanced diet. A healthy lifestyle contributes to better focus and concentraton.

Study Environment: Find a quiet and comfortable place to study. Minimize distractions and create an environment that is conducive to learning.

Study Techniques: Experiment with various study techniques to find what works best for you. This might include summarizing notes, creating mind maps, teaching the material to someone else, this might include summarizing notes, creating mind maps, teaching the material to someone else, or practicing past exam papers.

Study tips for 2024 year 12

Building work and refurbishment work at CHS

Woodwork room refurbishment, Hall Air Conditioning and Canteen Shade Shelter

On Monday 6th Nov the Wood work rooms which are original to the school, will begin being demolished. The rooms have been redesigned and will be refurbished from floor to ceiling. New machines will be installed and some structural work will be completed to remodel the rooms into more ergonomic and effective rooms.

These rooms are used by students from all years. TAS has been very successful with numerous students work being designed and built in these rooms and then later selected for the prestigious Intech exhibition.

The project will continue through November, December and complete in January just in time for the start of the new school year.

Starting in late December major work will commence in the Hall to install air conditioning. The Hall is both an important teaching and learning area as well as being in continual use for assemblies, and examinations.

This project will be very much welcomed by the entire school community and is scheduled to be finished by the end of the school holidays.

Thanks to the P&C a new shade shelter will be constructed in front of the canteen. This will keep the sun and rain off students as they queue at recess and lunch.

assessment



Years 7,8 and 9

During Term 4, students will participate in the Check-in assessment. The Check-in assessment is a NSW Department of Education online literacy and numeracy assessment available to support schools to assess and monitor student learning.

The assessment can supplement existing school practices to identify how students are performing in literacy and numeracy and to help teachers tailor their teaching more specifically to student needs. Students with a disability may receive the same level of support during the assessment they would normally receive in the classroom.

The assessment will be scheduled for our students during Week 6:

YEAR 7 - MONDAY /3TH NOVEMBER YEAR 8 - TUESDAY /4TH NOVEMBER YEAR 9 - WEDNESDAY /5TH NOVEMBER

All students complete a reading assessment and a numeracy assessment.

Students will be provided with headphones to enable them to hear audio during the assessment.

Debating

The Crestwood Debating Club workshops have continued on Tuesday afternoons from 3– 4pm. Even though the Premier's Debating Challenge is over for this academic year, students have committed to attending the afternoon workshops to continue honing their public speaking skills. They have researched and debated a range of topics such as:

-Less meat consumption to save the environment

-Product placement

Year 7 English

Students have completed their yearly examinations. They will now be continuing their study of the hero's journey steps and archetypes. Later this term they will be working together in groups to create their own hero's journey short films.

Year 8 English

This term students have been completing a poetry study based on the concept of 'discovery'. They have recently completed their yearly examinations. Students will now be continuing their study of the concept of 'discovery' by looking closely at the ideas of 'discovery of self' and 'discovery of the world' by analysing different forms of poetry and picture books. By the end of the term they will be participating in project based learning.

<u>Year 9 English</u>

The cohort will be sitting their yearly examination on Monday 6th November. Classes will then continue their study of either the gothic horror or science fiction genre. So far, they have studied short stories. Soon they will also analyse how films can utilise gothic horror or science fiction genre conventions.

Year 10 English

Students have completed their English yearly examination this week. Year 10 will now be completing an independent study on a related text of their own choice. The goal for this study is to explore texts of their own choosing and to identify the concept within it. Students will research and produce an analysis of their text. At the end, they will submit it to the class for a process of peer marking and review.

Year 11 English

English Standard students have officially started their first HSC unit: 'Common Module – Texts and Human Experiences'. All classes have been working hard in their analysis of the prescribed text, Kenneth Slessor's poetry.

English Advanced students have similarly started the Common Module unit. However, they are studying the novel, 'Nineteen Eighty-Four' by George Orwell.

PREPARING FOR YEARLY EXAMINATIONS

In addition to the strategies mentioned above, there are several other effective methods to prepare for a maths exam:


1. Conceptual understanding: Don't just memorise formulae. Make sure you understand why they work.


2. Problem solving practice: Solve a variety of maths problems. This helps you become familiar with different problem-solving techniques.

3. Group study: Collaborate with peers to discuss and solve maths problems.

4. Seek help: Come to room 29 on Monday at lunchtime. There's always a maths staff member on duty helping you with your questions.









Maths Musings

Numeracy

The numeracy team has identified that Year 8 struggles with interpreting nets and determining the shapes they create. This is a crucial skill as it relates to understanding the 3D structure of various geometric shapes.

Year 8 students completed their numeracy lesson this week, with a focus on nets. The students began with a pre-test in mathspace. Afterward, they engaged in a hands-on activity where they cut out and completed nets. This activity provides a visual understanding on how 2D nets can be folded to create 3D shapes. Following the hands-on activity, students had a discussion about the number of faces, edges, and vertices of each shape.

STEM Students design and create a remote control vehicle.

During this semester, students in the 10STEM course (Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics), studied components of Electronic Engineering. To make this topic more fun, students designed and created their own Jouster Remote Controlled Vehicles, This was a practical project which the students really enjoyed.

The students used the school workshops to assemble electronic components onto the circuit boards, solder on each component, connect with wiring the motors and wheels and build a transmitter and vehicle to house the components.

Students used their knowledge of Adobe Illustrator software and linked it to the laser cutter to experience CAD-CAM (Computer Aided Drawing-Computer Aided manufacturing), first hand.

EAL/D Reporting

As we approach the upcoming report season, please be informed that student reports will include a section regarding EAL/D for eligible students.

EAL/D (English as an Additional Language or Dialect) refers to students who speak a language or a dialect other than Standard Australian English and who require additional support to develop their English language proficiency.

- The EAL/D reporting process started at Crestwood High School last semester when Year 7 students received their EAL/D reports. This semester the reports will include all eligible students in Year 7 and Year 8. We are planning to expand our scope of EAL/D reporting to all students in Years 7 to 10 by the end of next year.
- The EAL/D section of the report will provide an overview of your child's current EAL/D stage and a comment from the EAL/D teacher. We encourage you to review your child's report and discuss it with them. You may also wish to contact the EAL/D teacher Mrs. Melnikova if you have any questions or concerns about their progress.



Year 10 Optional Work Experience 20-24 November 2023

Students in Year 10 have been offered an optional week of work experience for the 20-24 November 2023. This week is not a compulsory work experience week, students can choose to do it or remain here at school. Paperwork for the work experience program has been emailed to parents and students during the last school holidays, however students can collect a paper version from Mrs Fisher. The Student Placement Record (SPR) should be returned to the Career's Office by the 11 November 2023. Students and Parents will receive a copy of their contract prior to the placement.



Year 11 & 12 (TVET) Students

Students studying a subject at an outside provider (TAFE) for 2024 will receive an offer from late November to early December 2023. Mrs Fisher will notify students when an offer is available for each student. Students will need to accept or reject their offer and complete any extra paperwork required by the organisation. Any students who do not accept their offer by the closing date will automatically be withdrawn and the position will be given to a student on the reserve list or for late applications.

Year 12 students who wish to withdraw from their course for the HSC need to see Mrs Fisher and complete a withdrawal form.

Late applications will open from 27/11/23. Students can apply for courses with vacancies. These courses will be advertised closer to the date. Students who apply for a course that is full, will be placed on the reserve list.

All EVET students start their course Term 1 Weeks 2 (continuing student) or 3 (12/2/24). If you have any questions about EVET, please contact Mrs Fisher during school hours.
