

# Happenings

#### Remembrance day 2024 - 11.11.24

At 11am on 11 November 1918, an armistice signed between a German delegation and Allied representatives was carried out which brought an end to fighting in World War 1. People in the Allied countries rejoiced, but they also reflected on the terrible cost of victory.

In Australia and other countries whose soldiers had fought on the Allied side, 11 November came to be known as Armistice Day, a day to pause and remember the dead.

60,000 Australians had lost their lives in the war, almost 1 in 5 of those who served overseas. From a population of just over 5 million, this devastating loss touched families around Australia. After the war, Australian journalist Edward Honey wrote to a London newspaper, proposing 'five minutes of national remembrance' in honour of the fallen. His suggestion was well received, but 5 minutes of silence was impractical. So on 7 November 1919, King George V issued a proclamation calling for 2 minutes of silence at 11 am on 11 November. At the appointed hour, people across the British Empire paused for the first

time in common reflection. It started

an enduring tradition.

Two decades later, the world once again went to war. After another 6 years of global conflict and millions more dead, including 40,000 Australians, the Australian Government agreed to a British proposal to rename Armistice Day. It has been known ever since as Remembrance Day. Initially observed to honour the dead of both world wars, it now honours those who have died or suffered in wars and operations. Lest we forget.







#### THE SIMPSON PRIZE 2025

#### **Simpson Prize 2025**

The Simpson Prize is a national competition for Year 9 and 10 students that focuses on the service of Australians in World War I.

Each year, the Year 10 History Elective class of Crestwood High School participates by answering the given essay question as an in-school assessment task.

The students who achieved the top 3 results are then given the option to submit their essay to the official Simpson Prize Competition for the opportunity to represent the state of New South Wales.

The competition is funded by the Australian Government Department of Education and run by the History Teachers' Association of Australia.

This year's essay question was:

'Australia's relationship with Great Britain explains why Australia and individual

Australians went to war.'

Discuss the accuracy of this statement with reference to **either** World War One **OR** World War Two?






# Science matters.

#### **Year 7 Theatresports**

On Wednesday night, 5 students from Year 7 represented Crestwood High School in ImproAustralia's annual Theatresports competition hosted by St Patrick's College in Strathfield against several public and private school teams. Theatresports is a Drama based competition that involves responding to a prompt provided on the spot by judges through completely improvised scenes using a range of game formats that increase in difficulty each round for three rounds.

Our junior team consists of Yusha, Evelyn, Pranav, Cherisse, Alia and Avalyn. They have been extremely dedicated to building their skills in improvisation, meeting at lunch times twice a week to practise responding to prompts and refining their roles in a range of Theatresports games. 


## MATHS MUSINGS

#### Year 7

Year 7 students have just started learning Angle Relationships. Learning about angle relationships offers students valuable skills that extend beyond the classroom.

#### Angle Relationships

Understanding angles helps students build a solid foundation in geometry, which is essential for solving complex problems in higher levels of maths and science. By exploring concepts like complementary, supplementary, and vertically opposite angles, students develop critical thinking and problem-solving abilities.




In real life, angle relationships have practical applications in fields like architecture, engineering and design, where accurate measurements are crucial. For instance, knowing how angles work is essential when constructing buildings to ensure stability, designing furniture to fit properly in a space, or even in sports, where angles affect movement and positioning. Mastering angle relationships provides students with tools to interpret and navigate the world around them with accuracy and confidence.

#### **Fun Maths Facts**






#### Getting Away With Murder by Kathryn Foxfield



For Year 9 and Work Studies Students these weeks are compulsory, and all students are expected to participate in their designated program. Students having difficulties should contact Mrs Fisher before the due date provided. Parents should help and encourage their children but please be aware it is important for students to go through the process of job hunting and speaking to their prospective employer before the placement begins. The Student Placement Record (SPR) should be returned to Mrs Fisher by the due date outlined below or as soon after this date. Students have or will receive a paper version of the paperwork during class. Parents and students have or will receive an electronic version via their emails and it will also be available on canvas.

The benefits of work experience are very important to students for many reasons especially for getting into any career. No one can live life without learning something. What you learn and experience can often determine your success and failure in life. Learning combined with real life on the job experience is a winning formula for success. Your choices and your experience create the future for you. Work Experience enables students to explore possible career choices before fully committing to it.
