This week, **Dr Prue Salter** delivered interactive lectures to students in years 11, 12 and accelerated classes about study skills and developing good habits. This information will be uploaded onto the CANVAS study hub for students to access. The information was based on the "Power of Effective Study Techniques".

As students navigate their educational journey, the importance of mastering effective study techniques cannot be overstated. In today's learning environment, skills such as note-taking and time management play a crucial role in helping students not only understand content but also apply and recall knowledge deeply. The techniques below are essential for academic success.

The Art of Notetaking

Note-taking is an active engagement with the material that promotes better understanding and retention. Effective note-taking techniques, such as the Cornell Method, mind mapping, or bullet journaling can help students organise their thoughts and highlight key concepts.

- Enhances Comprehension By summarising and paraphrasing information in their own words, students engage with the content, leading to a deeper understanding.
- Encourages Active Learning Active notetaking requires students to listen, process, and analyse information during lessons, fostering critical thinking skills.
- Facilitates Review Well-organised notes make it easier to review material before exams, helping to reinforce learning and boost confidence.

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Mastering Time Management

Year 12 Matters

Year 12 is nearly halfway through the year, and as a special privilege, students have the opportunity to apply for flexible attendance. This information was sent via the portal a few weeks ago.

Year 12 may apply for privileges on the following conditions:

- Students can only alter their leaving time if they do not have a timetabled period for the last period of the day and/or they are enrolled in an externally delivered course.
- 2. Students should use the time after early departure for private study at home. They are to travel directly between school and home. This privilege is not for undertaking part time employment.
- 3. Students are not to leave the school grounds between periods during the day.
- 4. Students must be attending school, not late to school and have no outstanding N award warnings

Once privileges have been granted students and parents/carers will receive notification via the Sentral portal.

Year 11 Industrial Technology Students

Our Year 11 Industrial Technology Timber students have been hard at work refining their woodworking skills as they embark on an exciting furniture-making project. As part of their course, students are constructing the leg frames for a beautifully designed bedside table, learning fundamental joinery techniques and safe machinery operation along the way.

Throughout this term, students have been mastering a variety of traditional and modern joinery methods, including mortise and tenon, mitred joints, wedged tenons, and domino joints. These techniques are crucial in developing strong and durable furniture structures, reinforcing precision and craftsmanship in their work.





In addition to honing their hand skills, students have been trained in the safe and effective use of essential woodworking machinery. They have gained hands-on experience operating the band saw, drop saw, and router, which are key tools in shaping and assembling their projects. Safety is paramount, and our students have demonstrated great responsibility in following correct procedures and using personal protective equipment.

The bedside table project not only enhances their practical skills but also encourages problem-solving, design thinking, and attention to detail. We look forward to seeing their completed projects and celebrating their achievements. Stay tuned for updates as our students bring their creative visions to life!


Year 12 Chemistry Depth Study is currently happening with students using volumetric analysis to determine the acidic or basic concentration of household solutions like vinegar or cloudy ammonia and even lemon juice. They are using their highly tuned experimental skills with accurate titration equipment such as burettes and pipettes. Comparing their results to what is stated by the manufactures. The analysis process will allow them to apply complex calculations to their understanding of neutralisation processes. There are some demonstrating their skills with the equipment:

Highlights included a very active lion and lioness sibling pair, as well as the seal show - an excellent view from the splash zone!



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
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






YEAR 8 VISUAL ARTS


YEAR 12


Stage 5 students travelled to Circular Quay on a Ferry last week. They are learning how to use the app TripView Lite on their phones to plan their trip on public transport.




Crestwood High School • • Careers and Tertiary Expo

Students have chosen placements based on their future pathway choices. For some students it will solidify their chosen occupation and hopefully their future employment and we wish them all the best.






Year 10 Work Experience
