

Crestwood High School Students Join Community March Against Domestic Violence

On the morning of Friday, 2nd May, at 7:00 am, eleven senior students from Crestwood High School, accompanied by Student Support Officer Tara Gleig and Mr. Davis, proudly joined the Hills community in a powerful march for change—calling for an end to domestic and gender-based violence. The march commenced at Castle Place, with Hills Police blocking off the street to allow participants safe passage to Castle Hill RSL, where the march concluded. This significant event demonstrated unity, strength, and determination to address what is now recognised as a national crisis.

Following the march, students participated in a youth presentation titled "Empowering Young Voices: Recognising and Preventing Domestic Violence." The session was led by SSO Tara Gleig, Senior Constable Ethan West, and Senior Constable Joel McMullan. They were joined by guest speaker Craig Wilson. Together, they delivered valuable insights on the impact of domestic violence, how to recognise warning signs, avenues for support and referral, and the core principles of healthy, respectful relationships.

Students also supported the Purple Nail Tribe initiative where they painted the ring finger on their left hand purple. This initiative empowers men to break the silence on domestic violence. Purple Nail Tribe helps to spark critical conversations about ending domestic abuse. Visible support can inspire change, raise awareness, and show solidarity with those impacted by domestic violence.

Year 7 - Reading Between the Lines

This term, Year 7 students dive headfirst into the wonderful world of novels, not just to enjoy the story, but to unpack the clever choices authors make to get us thinking. It's all about asking *why* a character acts the way they do, *how* a writer creates meaning, and *what* a story reveals about people, society, and the world around us.

Students will learn to spot things like symbolism, narrative voice, and the all-important theme, and they'll start using the right literary terms, yes, metalanguage is making its debut! They'll be building their analytical skills through a mix of creative responses, close reading tasks, and discussions that help them piece together the puzzle of meaning.

By the end of the unit, they'll be ready to craft thoughtful, structured analyses that show not only what a story says, but how it says it, and why it matters. Think of it as developing their literary x-ray vision!

It's a big leap forward, and we're excited to see our young readers turn into critical thinkers and confident writers.



Year 8 - Enter Shakespeare, Stage Left

Year 8 – Enter Shakespeare, Stage Left

This term, Year 8 students step into the world of Shakespeare, where mischief, mistaken identities, and memorable one-liners rule the stage. Whether it's A Midsummer Night's Dream, Twelfth Night, or Much Ado About Nothing, students will explore one of the Bard's brilliant comedies, discovering why his works have stood the test of time.

Through the lens of character, plot, theme, and language, students will unravel the drama and dive into the world Shakespeare lived in, looking at the social, historical and cultural contexts that shaped his stories. They'll also begin to develop their own critical voice, learning how to write an academic essay and evaluate the literary value of the play.

It's all about learning to argue like a scholar, think like a critic, and maybe even laugh like an Elizabethan. Curtain up, Shakespeare awaits!



Year 9 - The Darker Side of Love

This term, Year 9 students delve into love, but not the hearts-and-flowers kind. Instead, they'll explore Shakespeare's take on love in all its messy, dramatic, and sometimes tragic forms. Through a close study of one of his iconic plays, Romeo and Juliet, and its modern reinterpretations, students will examine how stories of love, family, conflict and identity reflect the values of their time, and how those values shift when stories are retold for new audiences.

They'll investigate characterisation, imagery, dramatic irony and symbolism to uncover the deeper meanings behind the drama, and learn how context, both the composer's and their own, shapes the way a story is told and understood.

From analysing Shakespeare's original to critiquing and creating their own responses, students will sharpen their writing, polish their grammar, and practise the art of thoughtful interpretation. It's a unit full of passion, conflict, and big ideas, perfect for exploring the darker side of love.

Year 10 - The Director's Cut

This term, Year 10 students grab the popcorn, but keep their pens ready, as they dive into the world of auteur cinema. In this unit, students explore how some directors aren't just storytellers, but true cinematic visionaries, with a style and voice so distinct you could spot it a mile off. Think Burton, Hughes, Miyazaki and Nolan.

Through the close study of two films by a selected auteur, students will learn how directors take the reins shaping everything from camera angles to character arcs, from music to mise-en-scène—to bring their personal ideas and artistic flair to life. They'll look at how a filmmaker's background, beliefs and cultural context influence the recurring themes and stylistic signatures that appear across their work.

From analysing visual motifs to unpacking big ideas like identity, power, and morality, students will sharpen their film literacy and critical thinking skills. The unit wraps with a discursive writing task, where students develop their own thoughtful take on what makes these films, and their creators, so compelling.






BENEFITS OF READING

Crestwood High School Tertiary Information Expo

On Monday 5 May Crestwood HS held a Tertiary Information Expo for students in Years 10 – 12. The purpose of the Career's Expo is to provide students with invaluable information from a select group of tertiary providers for their future careers and subject choices.

This Expo is a valuable resource for students to collect information and learn about post school options in tertiary education they may not have had exposure to before or require the most up to date information regarding their choices. All students can get the most up to date information regarding early entry, available courses, and for Year 10 and 11 refine subject choices for senior school.



Year 11 & 12 should follow up the Expo in August and September by visiting the university of choice(s) Open Days for any last information or to get a feel of the university they are considering in attending. The Tertiary Information Expo compliments the Job and Career Expo held last term in February.

Year 10 Work Experience

Students have been receiving the information for work experience and the finalisation of their placement for next week. Students are expected to contact their employers the week prior to their placement and confirm they are attending the following week. Any issues need to be raised with Mrs Fisher. Students that are **unable** to attend a workplace must come to school as normal and complete the alternative work experience week at school. Year 10's work experience checklist is listed below. Students should have received their documents from Mrs Fisher by now. If not, they need to see Mrs. Fisher to collect them. All documents are available from CANVAS in the students Careers Class under Work Experience.

Students who are unable to attend must come to school and an e-work experience course has been developed for them. This is a great week for Year 10 to experience a week in the working world and to make decisions whether the career they have chosen to experience is the right choice for them. 2. Contact your employer - prior to you going for the following reasons

- To remind the employer you are coming.
- To check what time, where and whom to ask for on the first day.
- What you should be wearing
- Lunch facilities are there shops nearby, canteen or do you need to bring it with you.

3. Check transport to and from the workplace.

- Check times for buses / trains / travel time. Allow yourself time to be there at least 15 20 minutes before your start time. (Buses & trains, weather, accidents can affect your travel time and can make you late)
- Ensure your back up time also allows you to be there on time. (plan B)

4. Ensure you have all contact details with you in case something goes wrong, and your phone is fully charged for the working day. (Blue note)
